Yesterday the Mammoth Mine company posted its regular monthly dividend of 5 cents a share, or \$20,000, payable on the first day of June.

With the payment of this dividend the company will have distributed the amount of \$1,200,000 among its stockholders, \$100,000 of which represent payments made so far during the present year, and the indications are that before the first day of 1898 this letter sum will be duplicated, as it is reported that the company is in excellent financial condition, while the mine never looked better.

STRIKE IN THE HERCULES.

Important Discovery Made in This Stockton Property. Ed Mitchener of Stockton, who is directing operations in the development of the Hercules mine at that place, writes that a most important strike has been made in this property, and that the largest body of ore ever uncovered in the camp has been disclosed, while the ore is the finest ever found in the district.

This body of mineral has been cross-cut for several feet without finding the other wall, or proving its dimensions, and from what can be learned, the mine is likely to be classed among the bonanzas of the state in due time.

E. A. Benton, of the Hercules Mining Western ticket office, who is secretary and treasurer of the Hercules Mining company, will take a run out to the mine within a few days, for the purpose of inspecting the new discovery.

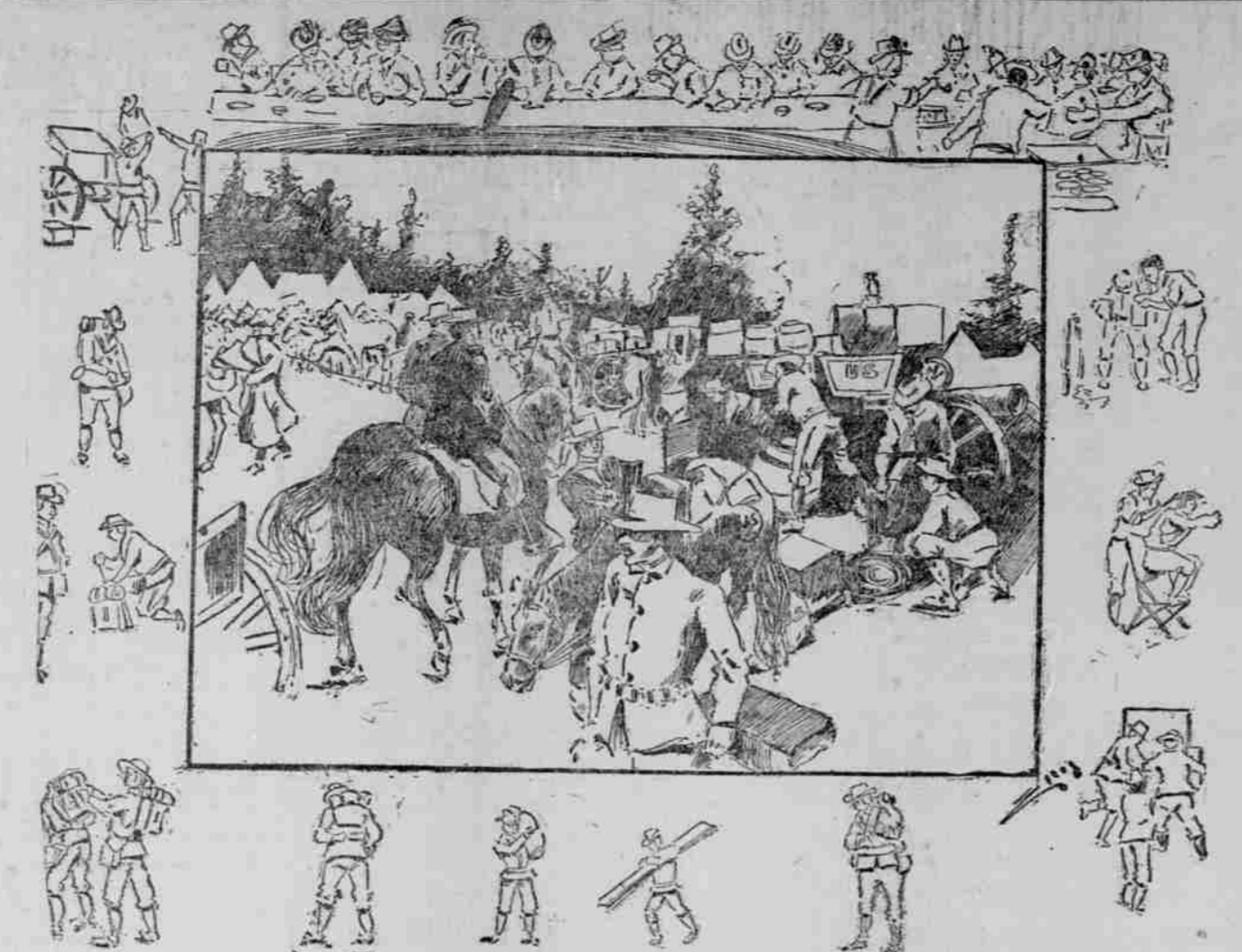

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NO THOUGHT OF PEACE

Spain's New Ministry Will Prosecute the War.

NO PHILIPPINE PLANS

EXPEDITION HAS NOT YET BEEN DEFINITELY DECIDED.

Government Will Place a Gold Loan Equivalent to \$60,000,000—Important Negotiations With France—The "Circumstantial" Cabinet in the Cortes—Sagasta's Speech.

Madrid, May 20.—The ministers, in full uniform, appeared in the senate today. Owing to the circumstances, the new cabinet is already nicknamed the "circumstantial cabinet."

The premier, Senor Sagasta, explained the ministerial crisis and asserted that the new ministry would continue the policy of the former ministry. He related how "Spain did everything to avoid war until America, violating all recognized diplomacy, attacked Spain with an injustice unprecedented in the annals of civilized history."

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THE MINING CONGRESS.

SECRETARY JOHNSON LEAVES FOR COLORADO.

Excursions to Be Run From Utah Points—Governor Hastings of Pennsylvania Appoints a Strong Delegation.

Secretary Johnson of the mining congress leaves this morning for Denver, Colorado Springs and perhaps one or two other Colorado cities on business for the congress.
