NOTICE TO BICYCLE OWNERS

Section 25 of the Revised Ordinances of American Fork City provides that it shall be unlawful for any person to ride any bicycle on any street, sidewalk or in any public place within this city without first procuring a license therefor and a number plate. 1920 licenses and number plates can be secured by making application to the City Recorder, or the City M.C. shall, upon payment of fifty cents. Bicycle owners are given until July 1, 1920, in which to procure licenses and number plates. Failure so to do, will make owners liable to the penalty as provided by law.
