### GOOD WORK OF COL. SOWERS.

Truth published a very neat little complimentary send-off to Col. P. S. Sowers. We are pleased to reproduce the article.

It is rumored that Col. Percy S. Sowers, special agent of the Interior department in Utah, may be transferred to another State, if the plans of interested parties here prevail. This would be a regrettable circumstance, because Col. Sowers is a man of quiet, determined character, broad, loyal and fearless and one who believes the people are co-ordinate. His enforcement of the laws against the great corporations and individuals alike has been without partiality to either. Besides, Col. Sowers has been of material assistance to the people of Utah and of this city especially. When it was proposed to throw the jaws of city creek open to settlement, an act which would have cost Salt Lake \$250,000 for the protection of its water supply, Col. Sowers' action stopped the game and saved the taxpayers here a large sum of money. His action in the watershed on the east side of the city, in the Wasatch range, was a splendid thing for us also. The department gives the special agent considerable discretion, and that discretion was exercised during the recent advance in the price of coal, for the benefit of the poor. Ordinarily men cannot go into the canyons and haul wood, but permission was granted by Col. Sowers to the Salvation Army and others, which enabled many poor families to secure a cheap fuel supply by picking up the dead timber scattered in these places. Utah could ill afford to lose him, and we hope the rumor will prove to be unfounded.
