

World Events For the Week

THURSDAY, JULY 2.

Chairman Taggart of the Democratic National party is presented with a Rocky Mountain burro, the "mascot" for the coming campaign.

John S. Sherman, Republican vice-presidential candidate is welcomed to Utica, New York, his home, by thousands of people.

Secretary Taft holds an important conference with Speaker Cannon and George B. Cortelyou in Washington.

A head-on collision between two fast specials on the Missouri Pacific railway near Knobster, Mo., results in the death of nine people with thirty-six injured.

P. W. Madsen withdraws as bondsman for A. W. Nelson, indicted for Utah National bank robbery and H. M. Dinwody is substituted.

Ogden is making extraordinary preparations for its forthcoming county fair, to be held this fall.

It is estimated that the wool clip of Utah, Idaho, Wyoming and Montana will exceed one hundred million pounds.

FRIDAY, JULY 3.

Thomas F. Raymond of Newark, N. J., and Sidney Smith of Chicago were appointed receivers of the United Box Board and Paper Company.

The Central City Stove Company, of Newark, Ohio, is looking over Salt Lake City with a view to establishing a local plant.

A movement is started in Salt Lake having for its object parking around Ensign peak.

The Utah Spray Manufacturing Company has been organized in Ogden. The company will manufacture articles for the spraying of trees.

Joel Chandler Harris, the noted poet-author died in Atlanta, Ga., aged 60 years. He was known as "Uncle Remus."

Rear Admiral Thomas died in Del Monte, Cal., of heart disease. It was the hottest day in Salt Lake's history.

SATURDAY, JULY 4.

"Battling" Nelson defeats Joe Gans in the seventeenth round in San Francisco.

A tornado visits New Mexico, resulting in the death of six and the injuring of about sixty.

Prof. Ross G. Marvin of Cornell university agrees to take Arctic trip with Commander Peary.

Mary Mannering, the well-known actress, files suit against her husband, James K. Hackett.

Burglars are very busy in Salt Lake.

A number of delegates to the Democratic National convention from western points pass through Salt Lake.

Fifty-five thousand people attend the resorts around Salt Lake.

A large number of state cities and towns fittingly observe the day.

United States Senator George S. Nixon, of Nevada, declares his state will go for Taft.

Canada will throw open to settlement 28,000,000 acres of land in Saskatchewan and Alberta counties.

Eight people killed and forty injured in a wreck on the narrow gauge railway at Alameda, California.

SUNDAY, JULY 5.

The Chicago Tribune announces that as a result of the observance of the Fourth throughout the country there were seventy-two deaths and 2,736 people injured.

Senator Murray Crane and Representative Lawrence of Massachusetts reach Hot Springs, Arkansas, the advance guard of the politicians who will conduct Taft's campaign.

Kentucky, according to United States Senator McCreary of that state, will vote solidly for Bryan.

For masquerading for nine years as a man, Mrs. August Sieb of New York was sentenced to five days in the workhouse in that city.

The heat in New York is so great that it is driving many people crazy.

Ten people were drowned in a flood at Lincoln, Nebraska.

All the cantons of Switzerland, with the exception of Geneva, restrict the sale of absinthe.

Sixty Cossacks take position behind British consulate in Teheran in expectation that many refugees would attempt to escape. The British charge d'affaires has protested to the Persian government.

MONDAY, JULY 6.

Caleb Powers of Kentucky will wed Miss Eleanor Bonham of York.

There were seven deaths and five suicides in Chicago on account of the heat.

Rumors of the probabilities of an acute diplomatic situation in

the far East has resulted in hundreds of applications for enlistment with the battleship fleet.

It is rumored in London that Princess Victoria will marry Frijof Nansen the famous Arctic explorer.

Postmaster-General Meyer will commence a crusade on all anarchistic papers and periodicals published in this country.

William J. Bryan is almost prevented from leaving his home at Lincoln, Neb., on account of the severe rain storms. The roads were impassable for some time.

A force of 3,000 rurales and federal troops are closing in on a band of insurrectionists in Mexico City, Mexico. It is reported the rebels number nearly 1,000.

TUESDAY, JULY 7.

The Utah delegation to the Democratic National convention want to nominate Samuel Newhouse as vice-presidential nominee. Mr. Newhouse refuses to have his name presented to the convention.

Mayor Bransford of Salt Lake sticks to his determination to have James Devine named as fire chief. The leading members of the American party have protested to the mayor, but he insists he will stand by his appointment and that Mr. Devine must be named.

Mrs. Mabel Blanche Cutler Butler, daughter of Gov. Cutler, has filed suit for divorce against her husband. Mr. Butler maintains that she cannot get the divorce.

Reports from the East indicate that dozens of people are dying from the heat.

The Democratic National convention is all for Bryan.

Wm. Glassman of Ogden announced that he will give up the Ogden postmastership, October 1st.

Mrs. Grover Cleveland issues a public letter of thanks and gratitude through the press, in response to the many messages received on the death of Mr. Cleveland.

Madame Anna Gould and Prince Helie de Sagan were married in London.

The Arctic steamer Roosevelt, commanded by Commander Robert E. Peary, left for the Arctic regions.

WEDNESDAY, JULY 8.

A demonstration in favor of Bryan lasted one hour and thirty-nine minutes at Denver convention. Fred Dubois is seated from Idaho. Col. Guffy of Pennsylvania is given adverse decision in seating of his delegation. The convention is harmonious and enthusiastic.

A number of Chinamen have been smuggled into America by way of Galveston, Texas.

Frank H. Hitchcock is named as Republican national chairman.

The Lusitania made a day's run of 643 miles, breaking the former record of 641 miles.

A meeting of automobilists from Salt Lake, Davis and Weber counties is held at Lagoon and resolutions passed having for their object the making of better roads between Salt Lake and Ogden and Salt Lake and Provo.

Gifford Pinchot, head of the forestry service will be in Salt Lake soon.

Wm. Spry of Salt Lake announces his candidacy for governor.

Several mass meetings will be held in Salt Lake to protest against the proposed new \$600,000 bond issue.

A huge four county fair will be held in Ogden this fall under the direction of Box Elder, Davis, Morgan and Weber counties.

The fifteenth infantry, stationed at Fort Douglas, is making preparations for its maneuvers at Colorado Springs, August 1 to 15.
