TELEGRAPHIC

His Last Swim. Buffalo, 24.—Capt. Matthew Webb, the noted English swimmer, perished in an attempt to swim the Niagara river whirlpool rapids, this afternoon. He was rowed in a skiff to a point in the river opposite the Old Maid of the Mist landing, by John McClay, ferryman of the falls, and leaped from the boat at two minutes past four. The daring swimmer passed the big rapids all right, keeping in the middle of the stream. When he struck the whirlpool, he was rushed to the American side where the waves, it is estimated, are from thirty to forty feet high. The last seen of him he was throwing up one arm, his intention being to pass the whirlpool on the Canada side. His shot of the rapids was extremely thrilling. The refusal of the railroad hotels to have anything to do with what they termed "his going to his death," rendered the affair financially a failure. The river has been searched for two miles below the whirlpool, but no trace of Webb was found. It is generally believed he was engulfed in the whirlpool. Webb leaves a wife and two children in England. Webb was watched by people in carriages but they could not get ahead of him. Fred. Kyle, manager for Capt. Webb, has arrived from the falls and gives up hope of his safety.

Beecher's Belief. Chicago, 24.—Last Sunday Rev. J. Spencer Kennard, pastor of the Fourth Baptist Church, took occasion of Rev. Henry Ward Beecher's presence in this city to deliver a pleasantly termed sermon combating the views of the great Brooklyn divine. To-morrow the papers will publish a breezy, brotherly letter from Beecher to Brother Kennard. It is perhaps the most unequivocal statement of Beecher's views yet made public. He says he knows he is orthodox and evangelical as to the facts and substance of the Christian religion, and knows equally well that he is not orthodox as to the philosophy which has hitherto been applied to these facts. He calls himself a cordial Christian evolutionist, but does not agree with the agnosticism of Spencer Huxley and Tyndall. He believes the animal part of man evolved from beings below him, while in spiritual nature he is the son of God. Man, he says, is not sinful by nature, but voluntarily. He does not believe in the fall of Adam nor the inheritance of his guilt. Dr. Kennard dined with Beecher this evening.

BRIEF TELEGRAMS.

Cholera has broken out among British soldiers in Egypt. Five hundred deaths in Cairo from cholera on Monday. Two thousand rolling mill operatives are on strike in South Chicago. The Mexican Telegraph Company has been incorporated in New York. The crop prospects are generally good throughout the middle western states. The Lord Mayor of London entertained the American rifle team on Tuesday. Twenty-five students were arrested at Harrisburg, Pa., last week; cause unknown. Two striking operators at Butte, M. T., were arrested for malicious interference with the wires. The Louisiana Lottery Company have entered suit against the postmaster general for \$100,000. Governor Crittenden and party, of Missouri, are on their way west, and will visit Salt Lake. Some leading Chicago butter dealers will lose from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000 in butter this month. Hardy, the Polk City murderer, was taken from the jail at Harlem on Monday night and lynched. Commodore Leitch, of the Cunard fleet, is dead. He has been fifty years in the service of the company. Fourteen persons were committed for trial at Mullingar, Ireland, for complicity in the murder of Mrs. Smythe. Seven women and children were drowned by the upsetting of a pleasure boat on lake Luzerne, Switzerland. The government is taking steps to prevent the unlawful inclosure of public lands that has been going on recently. After the Emperors of Austria and Germany confer at Lachel, Emperor William will have an interview with King Humbert, of Italy. A pistol ball was fired through the window of the Western Union office at Atlanta, Ga., on Tuesday morning, striking an operator on the hip. At Eaton Rapids, Michigan, a man named Eugene Henry was fatally injured, and his three children killed, by a cyclone. His wife was also hurt. The reunion of the Grand Army of the Republic at Denver is a grand success, and nothing has yet occurred to mar the harmony of the proceedings. The strikers are holding enthusiastic meetings all over the country, and in nearly all the large cities the boards of trade are anxious that the companies make some concession. A Good Sign. B. Minn., 24.—The Chinese frigate recently constructed at Saigon will sail from that port on August for Shanghai. This is regarded as an indication of a peaceful solution of the difficulty between China and France.
