The Final Count.

New York, November 13.—The gains and losses in returns of the board of canvassers, so far as the canvass has been made, as compared with the press returns sent out on election night, was as follows: First Assembly District, Third Election District, Blaine gains ten votes; Seventh Election District, Third Election District, Cleveland gains three votes; Twelfth Election District, Cleveland gains one vote; Fifteenth Election District, Cleveland loses one vote; Seventeenth Election District, Cleveland loses one vote; Seventeenth Election District, Blaine gains seventy-eight votes and Cleveland loses 155 votes; Third Election District, Sixteenth Election District, Cleveland loses two votes; Twenty-first Election District, Cleveland gains two votes; Twenty-third Election District, Cleveland gains one vote; Twenty-sixth Election District, Blaine loses three votes; Fourth Assembly District, Twelfth Election District, Cleveland loses ten votes; Twenty-first Election District, Blaine gains one vote.

New York City.

New York, November 13.—Vote on Presidential ticket canvassed by the board of canvassers is as follows: First Assembly District (Fourth Election District missing), Blaine, 2,231; Cleveland, 4,265; Butler, 92; St. John, 15. Second Assembly District, Blaine, 2,120; Cleveland, 3,239; Butler, 94; St. John, 82. Third Assembly District, Blaine, 2,624; Cleveland, 5,111; Butler, 126; St. John, 142. Fourth Assembly District, Blaine, 2,391; Cleveland, 6,322; Butler, 158; St. John, 10. Fifth Assembly District, Blaine, 2,005; Cleveland, 4,508; Butler, 129; St. John, 17. Sixth Assembly District, Blaine, 2,850; Cleveland, 5,212; Butler, 129; St. John, 5. Seventh Assembly District (two election districts missing), Blaine, 4,563; Cleveland, 4,242; Butler, 88; St. John, 74. Eighth Assembly District, Blaine, 4,722; Cleveland, 4,140; Butler, 69; St. John, 10.

The Stockmen's Association.

Chicago, November 13.—The second annual convention of American stockmen assembled at the Sherman House at 11 this morning. Nearly five hundred delegates were present. De Witt Smith, of Ill., was elected temporary chairman. The roll call showed delegates present from twenty-two States and Territories, committees on permanent organization and order of business were appointed of one member from each State and Territory represented.

Several gentlemen from Omaha were invited to take part in the convention, which at noon adjourned till half-past 2 this afternoon. This evening Geo. B. Loring, of Massachusetts, United States Commissioner of Agriculture, will read a paper on cattle. Among the papers to be presented to the convention are one on "Sanitary Science," by J. D. Hopkins, of Wyoming. "Danger from Chronic Cases of Pneumonia," by Dr. Garlson, of Philadelphia; also one by Dr. Salmon, of the United States Treasury Commission and others.

Cholera.

PARIS, November 13.—From midnight to noon to-day there were thirty-three deaths from cholera in Paris, nineteen of which were in hospitals. The revised report for yesterday gives a total of eighty-one deaths, all but twenty of which occurred in hospitals. Eighty-four fresh cases were received into the hospitals yesterday.

Rhosos' Aymor via Galveston, November 13.—Another case of cholera has appeared here, causing great alarm. The strictest quarantine will be observed on all vessels coming from France. Three Italian steamers are expected soon; they will not be allowed to enter the port. The press censures the agent of the Italian line and all others who have tried to avoid the sanitary regulations.

Michigan's Delegation.

DETROIT, November 13.—The Congressional delegation in this State stands 7 Fusionists to 4 Republicans, a gain of 1 for the Fusion. The Fusionists lost 2 and gained 3 Congressmen, making the delegation stand as above.

Roscoe Conkling for United States Senator.

New York, November 13.—The World, this morning, in an editorial on the next Senator from New York, says: Would it not be to the honor of the State and to the credit of the people if party considerations could be laid aside and the Legislature be induced to tender the United States Senatorship unanimously to Roscoe Conkling? The Graphic, this afternoon, in an editorial very complimentary to Conkling, says: Now, if Mr. Conkling should be the Democratic candidate for United States Senator, has he friends enough among the Republicans of the Legislature to secure his election?

New York "Herald's" Figures.

New York, November 13.—The Herald, in its summary of the vote of New York State, by counties, as far as ascertained by the official count, gives Cleveland a plurality of 1,254 votes. In the case of the six counties, however, where the canvassers adjourned owing to some technicality, and where the plurality may be changed, the unofficial figures are given. The votes for Butler and St. John are as follows: St. John, 22,739; Butler, 12,539. In the counties already canvassed there is no material change in the majorities since yesterday. Blaine has gained one vote in Columbia and two in St. Lawrence County, and lost two votes in Schoharie, making his net gain one vote. Cleveland has gained six votes in King's and lost ten in Oneida, making his net loss four votes. This reduces Cleveland's plurality by five votes, making it now 1,254. Only three counties have not yet furnished their official result—Franklin, Greene and New York.

Heard a Long Distance.

CLEVELAND, November 13.—A rumble and shock, believed to be caused by an explosion at Toledo, was plainly heard and felt this morning at Leavittsburg, distant from Toledo about 150 miles, on an air line from here 112 miles east from Toledo. Persons who observed the motion thought it was an earthquake. At Chagrin Falls, twenty-four miles southeast of here, it was supposed cannons were being fired in this city, over the election returns and telephone inquiries were made to ascertain what the artillery salute signified.

The "Lucky Horse Shoe."

ALLENTOWNS, Pa., November 13.—Some time ago John J. Shadt, of this city, sent a beautifully finished horse shoe, bearing the words "Lucky to Go, Cleveland," The following acknowledgment was received to-day: "Since the receipt of your present, the contest has been decided in favor of the party which I represent. I shall give due credit to the horse shoe for what has already happened and shall carefully preserve it, in the hope that it may bring success to my efforts to give to the people good government."

American-West Indies Treaty.

MADRID, November 13.—At the Cabinet Council last evening the Minister of foreign affairs announced the conclusion of a treaty of commerce between America and the Spanish West Indies. He stated that a few unimportant questions pertaining to sugar and cereals will still open, but they were not likely to interfere with the final adoption of the treaty.

Murdered for Money.

DENVER, November 12.—Robert Standing and wife were discovered dead this morning, at their house on a ranch, seven miles from Pine Grove, a small station on the South Park road. The circumstances indicate they were murdered for money. Standing was one of the Colorado pioneers, quite wealthy, and well known and was an ordained preacher of the anti-polygamy branch of the Mormon church.

Greely.

WASHINGTON, D. C., November 13.—Lieutenant Greely called at the War Department to-day, after reporting his arrival at General Hazen, at the signal camp, and paid his respects to Secretary Lincoln.

Kentucky.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., November 13.—The official returns from the Ninth district show that Wadsworth (Republican), is elected to Congress over Powers (Democrat), by 300 majority.

More Sulfur.

LONDON, November 13.—Bullion from Holland to the amount of £60,000 was again purchased in the open market yesterday for shipment to America.

Only Dynamite.

CLEVELAND, November 13.—The shock felt this morning in various places of Northern Ohio is attributed to the explosion of a dynamite factory in Toledo.

Paris was condemned to pay the costs of the divorce suit.

The Democrats of Washington, D. C., and vicinity celebrated Cleveland and Hendricks' election Thursday night, by a grand torchlight procession.

Duncan C. Ross has challenged any man in the world to wrestle for \$5,000 or \$10,000, and has deposited \$250 forfeit with the mayor of Cleveland, O.

At Brooklyn, Thursday, Independent Republicans met to organize permanently. Beecher was there, and said in local politics he was a Republican; in national, a Democrat.

While the procession was moving in Washington, on Thursday night, a negro fired into the column and shot a torch-bearer, named Sullivan; the colored man was locked up.

A telegram from Gordon, at Khar-toum, dated August 26, was read in the Commons yesterday, saying: "Provisions for five months, shall send Stewart with French and English consuls to the relief of Dongola, after destroying Berber."

At the Stockmen's Convention in Chicago a permanent organization was effected yesterday. De Witt Smith, of Illinois, president; Thomas Sturgis, of Wyoming, secretary; and George E. Morrow, of Illinois, assistant secretary. Each State and Territory was allowed one vice-president.
