Next year will probably see a lot of changes in the course. There is talk of moving the bunker for the first hole up the hill about twenty yards, which would do away with any penalty for long driving, and at the same time not penalize those who drive a moderately long ball. The crooked ditch crossing the fair green for the fifth hole is to be straightened, and the second water ditch toward the home hole, which now catches long drives, is to be moved toward the hole some twenty or thirty yards, to the slope of the hill. At present the course does penalize unjustly the man who plays an unusually long game.
