AN ORDINANCE.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AND re-enacting Section 288 of the Revised Ordinances of Salt Lake City of 1903, in relation to the Board of Health, the appointment and compensation of the same, as amended by an ordinance passed by the City Council February 5, 1906, and approved by the Mayor February 7, 1906.

Section 1.—That Section 288 of the Revised Ordinances of Salt Lake City of 1903, in regard to the Board of Health, the appointment and compensation of the same, as amended by an ordinance passed by the City Council February 5, 1906, and approved by the Mayor February 7, 1906, be, and the same is hereby amended and re-enacted so as to read as follows:

SECTION 288. BOARD OF HEALTH. APPOINTMENT. COMPENSATION. The Mayor shall, by and with the advice and consent of the council, appoint, during the term for which he is elected, a Board of Health, consisting of a Health Commissioner, an assistant Health Commissioner, each of whom shall be a graduate of a reputable medical college, and two citizens. The Mayor shall be ex-officio chairman of the board. The compensation of each member of the Board of Health (exclusive of the Mayor, Health Commissioner and assistant Health Commissioner) is hereby fixed at five (\$5.00) dollars for each meeting attended. The Health Commissioner shall receive as compensation, in full for all services rendered the city, a salary of twelve hundred (\$1,200.00) dollars per annum, payable monthly as are the salaries of other city officers.

The Mayor shall also, by and with the advice and consent of the council, appoint, during the term for which he is elected, one assistant Health Commissioner, who shall be a graduate of a reputable medical college, and who shall do such acts and perform such duties pertaining to the Health Department of the city as may be delegated to, and required of him by the Health Commissioner according to law; and who shall receive as compensation, in full for all services rendered the city, a salary of nine hundred (\$900.00) dollars per annum, payable monthly as are the salaries of other officers.

Section 2. All ordinances and resolutions or parts of ordinances and resolutions in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect upon approval.
