WINNING LONG SHOTS OF 1908.

Only 37 Horses in More Than 7,000 Races Scored
at 40 to 1 or Better.

Out of more than 7,000 races run on American tracks during 1908 only thirty-seven winners were quoted at odds of 40 to 1 or better, according to an eastern sporting authority. The longest priced winner of last year was Percy Green, who scored at Louisville last May at odds of 139 to 1, the price paid by the pari-mutuel machines, which were then in use at all of the Kentucky tracks. The only horses to win at 100 to 1 were Alleviator and Colonel Jewell, at Santa Anita; Semper Vera and Mystifier, at Latonia. August Belmont's Field Mouse, who won at Belmont Park last spring, was quoted at 100 to 1 by a few layers, but the general quotation was 60.

Alleviator, owned by E. J. Long, was the first winning long shot of the year when he scored on January 7 at 100 to 1. On January 22, at Oakland, I. H. Miller's Raleigh, passed the judges with 50 to 1 about him. H. Oots's McNally won at New Orleans on March 2 at 75 to 1, and E. E. Beatty's Colonel Jewell, 100 to 1, scored at Santa Anita on March 10. H. Miller's Sugar Pine was successful on the first day at Benning with 50 to 1 about him, while O. L. Richards's Dress Parade, a 60 to 1 shot, was triumphant at the same track on April 7.

At Louisville on May 5 and 6, respectively, J. R. Wainwright's Nancy, 82 to 1, and H. McCarren, Jr.'s, Wheat Bread, 56 to 1, got the money. R. F. Carman put over a juicy good thing in Right Sort, 60 to 1, at Jamaica, on May 8, and five days later Percy Green, 139 to 1, caused an upset at Churchill Downs. Field Mouse's success came on May 16, and two days later J. W. Ferguson's Hammetrical, 70 to 1, finished in front at Louisville, where, within the following week, J. M. Goode's Elysium, 42 to 1; W. Grater's Ethelda, 98 to 1; John Marklein's W. A. Leach, 48 to 1; E. A. Brennan's Petulant, 64 to 1, and J. T. Ireland's Ironbound, 53 to 1, were victorious.

At Latonia from June 5 to June 30 there were seven successful long shots—S. K. Hughes's White Face, 60 to 1; A. W. Perrin's Lady Ruby, 85 to 1; D. T. Morris's Crawford, 41 to 1; C. V. Mueller's Dream, 92 to 1; Mrs. H. B. Davis's Water Lake, 62 to 1; P. T. Chinn's Uncle Walter, 42 to 1, and W. A. Smith's Semper Vera, 101 to 1.

The longest priced winner at Sheepshead Bay was J. J. Moran's D'Arkle, who went over the plate at 50 to 1 on July 2. At Latonia on July 6, D. N. Prewitt's Irene B. scored at 75 to 1. Then Fleming & Clancy's Adela R., a 50 to 1 shot, was a winner at Seattle on July 16. P. T. Chinn put Joe Galtens over at 40 to 1 at the Fort Erie track on August 4. A week later Prolific and Lady Quality won at Seattle with the respective prices of 60 to 1 and 50 to 1. D. B. Jones's Flarney was a successful 40 to 1 shot at Jamestown on September 15, and the ensuing week W. J. Young's Bonnie Bard and W. Grater's Natasha landed the coin at odds of 72 to 1 and 65 to 1 over the Lexington track.

P. J. Miles's Mystifier won at Latonia on November 9 at 100 to 1, while W. E. Walsh's Coon scored at 60 to 1 on the same track two days after. The last winning long shot of the year was Jack Bennet's Molesey, who caught the eyes of the judges first at Santa Anita on December 8, quoted at 40 to 1.
