A new subdivision of the city, close in, in fact not over a quarter of a mile from the old center at its western boundary, has been platted by the Tooele Improvement company. This tract of 170 acres, now 800 city lots, will become the new business city. It will contain the homes of the smelters and their families, and upon it will be located the hotels, the stores, the shops and all the business incidental to a modern city. The only station of the Tooele Valley railroad will be near its center. A lumber ward has already been put in in order to facilitate the building of the new town, and arrangements have been made for a four-story hotel which will be erected immediately.

A large reception room opens from the street entrance and to the right of the main entrance is Mr. Hall's private offices. The chapel opens directly from the west end of the reception room and has a seating capacity of 250, and the minister's rostrum, family room, and choir room, are so arranged that family mourners, and choir are invisible from the audience room of the chapel, but in convenient view of the minister. The chapel reception room and show rooms are equipped with cork covered floors, and a partition forming the south wall of the chapel permits the handling of large audiences with ease, and a minimum of any possible discomfort. The morgue, laying out rooms and show rooms, are all on the main floor, while the fire-proof receiving vault and

stock room are in the basement. A rather novel feature consists of two private laying out rooms, obviating the necessity of relatives or friends of deceased persons visiting the morgue to view bodies. Mr. Hall carries the largest stock of caskets and funeral supplies in the state and his new show room is thirty-three by thirty feet, with high ceiling. The walls and the center of the floor are stocked with tiers and pyramids of caskets.
