It would seem that the typographical union could devise some means of keeping the youthful press feeders in hand about the time the annual spring strike fever hits them, and in doing so avoid delay, trouble and expense to the public and lay offs for themselves. It is hard to predict the immediate outcome of the present trouble. Certainly no one would blame the printing companies for holding out forever against the arrogant demands in the way of shop rules of the press feeders.

The scandal that has arisen in the administration of the office of superintendent of buildings and grounds of the Board of Education is fast developing into as dirty a mess of padded payrolls, political tricks and turns, personal mud slinging, and, to give every one concerned the benefit of the doubt, such willful negligence, as has been aired in Salt Lake in a long time.

In the face of conditions that have existed for a year or more it has taken the Board of Education quite a while to act. If the charges that have been filed against Superintendent of Buildings George M. Bridwell are sustained, and he has already admitted the little incident of nine of his family being on his payroll under most any old names, his job ought to last about twenty minutes, and after that further proceedings might serve to ease off the public wrath that is warming up toward those who have through negligence or willfulness, permitted Bridwell to milk the school fund for nine of his own relatives, and three or four sons of a friendly board member or two. Mathonihah Thomas is having his own troubles in conducting the investigation into the irregularities charged against Bridwell. Mathonihah says he has received a quiet kick on the shins to the effect that if he doesn't quit, his plurality of wives will be given some unwanted publicity. Bridwell says further that the Mormon member knew all about the fictitious names on the payroll, and that it wasn't until his chances for re-election to the board last fall seemed in danger that he objected at all. It has developed that aside from employing all the relatives that could be conveniently spared from family household duties, Bridwell annexed property from school buildings, O. K.'d time turned in for Sunday and holiday work by his relatives, this time having been charged up at the rate of three, four and five dollars a day and the work never performed. Three or four people under Bridwell performed a little janitor work now and then when not too busy riding around in automobiles, and charged up their time as carpenters at the highest rate of wages.

In their efforts to build a city here before they die, some of the brethren are evidently taking some very short cuts.

The first high class race meeting that the people of Salt Lake City have had an opportunity to support is scheduled to begin next Saturday and continue forty days and the prospects now are most brilliant for a season of good sport and a race meeting that should establish Salt Lake City as a real racing center for the future. This meeting will be in the nature of an experiment, very naturally, but its promoters are so sanguine of a successful season that they already are planning for a mile track and a modern racing plant for future meetings. Those plans include a spring and fall meeting each year and in the event of success this spring, these plans will be put into execution without delay.
