LEGAL NOTICES.

AN ORDINANCE.

An ordinance levying a tax and for the assessment of property on all streets within the district bounded on the north by the north line of Fifth South Street, on the east by the west line of East Temple Street, on the south by the center line of Ninth South Street, and on the west by the west line of Second West Street, in Sewer District No. 2, for the construction of sewers.

Be it ordained by the City Council of Salt Lake City, Utah:

SECTION 1. That the City Council does hereby levy the tax and provide for the assessment of the same upon the property hereinafter described in Sewer District No. 2, for the construction of sewers, to-wit:

In Lots 1 and 8, Block 30; 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5, Block 31; 1, 2 and 4, Block 32; 9, 10 and 11, Thorn's Court Subdivision, Block 32; 5, 6, 7 and 8, Block 24, and 5 and 6, Block 23, all in Plat "A," abutting on both sides of Second West

Street between Fifth South and Sixth South Streets, and on both sides of Sixth South Street between West Temple and Second West Streets.

This tax is levied to defray the expense of constructing vitrified pipe sewers eight (8) inches in diameter upon the portions of said streets opposite the property hereinbefore and hereinafter described to be especially affected and benefited by said improvement, and it is hereby adjudged, determined and established that said property will be especially benefited thereby to the full amount of the tax hereby levied, and said parcels of land are hereby assessed at an equal and uniform rate in accordance with the linear foot frontage upon said portions of said streets fronting upon and to a depth of twenty-five (25) feet back therefrom, and the tax hereby levied and to be assessed upon said parcels of land is nine thousand fifty-two and 85-100 (\$9,052.85) dollars, or two and 4,182,553-10,000,000 (\$2,4182853) dollars per front or linear foot of abutting property for sewer on both sides of street, there being 3,743.50 feet of abutting property within the boundaries of the lots, blocks and streets above mentioned in said district, which is the total cost and cost per front foot of said sewer according to the contract entered into for the performance of said work and making said improvement, with James Kennedy, dated July 7, 1907, and the Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to assess in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance for the purpose herein mentioned:

Sewer on Both Sides of Street.

The east side of Lots 1 and 8, Block 30; the west side of Lots 2, 3, 4 and 5, the east 305 feet of the south side of Lot 2, and the west 305 feet of the south side of Lot 1, Block 31; the west 140 feet of the south side of Lot 1, the east 140 feet of the south side of Lot 4, the south side of Lot 2, Block 32; the south side of Lots 9, 10 and 11, Thorn's Court Subdivision, Block 32; the east 140 feet of the north side of Lot 5, the west 140 feet of the north side of Lot 3, and the north side of Lots 6 and 7, Block 24; the east 305 feet of the north side of Lot 5, and the west 305 feet of the north side of Lot 6, Block 23, all in Plat "A," Salt Lake City Survey, as the same are shown upon the official plats of said city to a depth of twenty-five (25) feet back from said streets, and to collect said tax.

SECTION 2. Said tax shall become

and be delinquent in five equal installments, as follows, to-wit: One-fifth thereof one year after the approval of the ordinance confirming the levy of the tax for the payment for such improvement; one-fifth thereof in two years after such approval; one-fifth thereof in three years after such approval; one-fifth thereof in four years after such approval; and one-fifth thereof in five years after such approval. One or more of said installments, or the whole tax may be paid on or before ten days after the approval of the ordinance confirming the levy of the tax. One or more installments, or the whole special tax may be paid on the day any installment becomes due by paying the amount thereof and interest to date of payment. Each of said installments shall bear interest at the rate of six (6) per cent per annum from the date of the approval of the ordinance confirming the levy of said tax until date of delinquency, and eight (8) per cent per annum from delinquency until paid.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall take effect upon approval. Passed by the City Council of Salt Lake City, Utah, July 12, 1909, and referred to the Mayor for his approval. J. B. MORETON, City Recorder.
