

D PLAYHOUSES ALL NEXT WEEK

There are three acts in John C. Fisher's big musical comedy, "The Red Rose," which Manager George D. Poyer has again secured for presentation at the Salt Lake theatre, where it opens a three days stay Monday, Dec. 30th. This naturally calls for much accurate detail to which Mr. Fisher is said to have responded most liberally with three elaborate and complete settings. The first act is laid in the art school of Mr. Julien Duprez, in the Latin quarter of Paris. As would be typical of such an establishment, the works of art are numerous, and Mr. Fisher is said to have expended many thousands of dollars to give the scene a proper atmosphere. The second act shows the baron's chateau on the outskirts of Paris. Fine opportunities are here given for coloring symbolic of a great man's estate. The last act takes place at the ball of the Four Arts and accuracy is said to dominate every detail.

This tremendous organization, numbering some sixty-five persons and requiring two 60 foot baggage cars to transport the scenic equipment, will be seen here in its entirety.

While theatregoers in New York are raving over Geo. M. Cohan's latest success, "Broadway" Jones, the play will be seen at the Salt Lake theatre next Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

This, in a nutshell, is the story around which Mr. Cohan has written one of his best plays New York has seen in years.
