Utah injected its aerial transportation system into the situation. Four mines are coming to market regularly with ore from Alta. They are the Michigan-Utah, Alta Consolidated, South Hecla and Cardiff. It has been years since the district has had such an output and decades since it presented such a glowing outlook for the future.

With several Tintic mines, notably Chief Consolidated, Victoria, Eagle & Blue Bell, Grand Central, May Day and Gold Chain on the eve of unexampled productivity and all the Knight mines getting ready to coin their milling ore into dollars through local concentration, that district needs brass bands and megaphones instead of curtains and crepe. Bingham has a dividend record that will take care of its reputation. Beaver county has two or three full grown mines, all proved within twelve months. Bull Valley and Santaquin districts were spoken of in the annual review last week. Stockton, Brigham City and a host of other prospective shipping districts proclaim that if Utah lets its mining industry remain in the background it will not be because the industry is ugly but because it hasn't the clothes to appear in public.

TWO SPECIAL ROUND-UPS.

According to the popular demand which has been made for an extension of the work transacted at the annual Farmers' Round-up and Housekeepers conference which has been a feature of the Utah Agricultural college for the past several years the college officials have decided this year to hold two of these special round-ups and conferences. One of these will be

held at the main building at Logan, convening from January 27th to February 8th, this will be essentially for the people living in the central and northern part of the state. The other will be held at Richfield commencing February 13th and extending up to and including the 23rd.

It is hoped by this arrangement to not only increase the attendance at these gatherings but also to facilitate the ease with which those so desiring to do so may attend. Illuminated posters are now being distributed by the college throughout the entire state and it is expected that the conventions this year will be far ahead both in the point of numbers and in the matter discussed of any that have been held previously.

The latest experiments made with radium confirm the statement that it has the property of changing the color of precious and semi-precious stones. The change is effected merely by continued exposure to radium salts, and the gems which give the best results are sapphires. A young German chemist is said to have secured sensational results from this discovery. He recently purchased several varieties of sapphires and placed them in a box with a small quantity of radium bromide. The transformations of the stones after about a month's exposure are described as follows:

ORIGINAL COLOR.

White or uncolored.
Blue.
Violet.
Wine colored.
Inferior dark colored.

NEW COLOR.

Topaz-like yellow.
Emerald green.
Sapphire blue.
Beautiful ruby.
Deep violet.
