WELL, when is the gas going to be turned on.

The furniture for the new City Hall has mostly arrived and part of it is in position.

RATHER a brisk trade yesterday. Considering the time of the year the merchants can not complain. Work is comparatively plenty.

The annual meeting of the Chamber of Commerce will take place next Monday evening when the election of officers for the ensuing year will be in order.

GEORGE SLATER, a teamster, engaged in hauling ice to the depot, slipped from his load and broke his wrist Friday afternoon. Dr. Bryant reduced the fracture and the patient will resume work in a short time.

J. W. PIKE has finally consented to allow his name to be used in connection with the Probate Judgeship of Utah County. Mr. Pike is the court stenographer, familiar to most of Ogden's citizens.

The secretary of the Chamber of Commerce is in receipt of a large number of communications from would-be settlers, asking after the various commercial, climatic, sanitary and other conditions prevalent in the Junction City.

This amusement patrons will have plenty of opportunity to enjoy themselves the balance of the winter. Most of the wards are doing something in that line and a good number of attractions have been booked at the Opera House.

JOHN S. LINDSEY appeared in Hazel Kirke last evening instead of Virginius, as previously advertised. The change was made at the request of many citizens and gave entire satisfaction. The company through out is a good one and shows much study and painstaking in the rendition of their parts.

The new nepot begins to loom up in great shape. The carpenters can be seen on its roof shingling from a long distance. Inside the plumbers are putting in the pipes for steam and gas and as soon as the windows are in steam will be used to make the temperature inside comfortable, and the plaster work can be done as well in cold as in warm weather.

FRIDAY evening the Fifth Ward Schoolhouse was packed to its utmost capacity. The occasion was the concert previously noticed, followed by the emotional drama Out in the Streets. Nearly every number in the concert received an encore, and the drama was well received, indeed. It is stated that this company have in preparation another play which will be announced in a short time.

Was it Robbery?

Yesterday afternoon a man, apparently about 45 years of age, complained to the city authorities that he had been robbed in a saloon on Fifth Street only a short time previous, and that there were two of the alleged robbers working together. The police promptly turned out to hunt the alleged highwaymen, but up to a late hour no developments were reported. As near as could be learned from the self-styled victim, he was met by the two men above referred to, and after conversing with them for some time was asked into the saloon, and they immediately went to a rear room and seated themselves around a table and proposed to play cards. The victim took out some money, \$85 in gold, he says, and placed it in front of him, while one of the others placed some money on the table to be in readiness for the play. The third party stated it would not do to use the money to play with, but that he would take it and get some chips. This was reluctantly consented to by both parties, and the man raking in all that was in sight, stepped out the back door. After waiting a reasonable length of time for his return, the victim began to get uneasy and inquired where the man had gone for the chips. The other did not seem to know, so the first got up and went out the same door to look for the man with his money. The door opened into a yard, enclosed by a high board fence, but no egress was visible. Here amongst some coal a coat and some cards were found, but no man. The other as soon as the victim went out the back way, left by the front, and has not been seen since. Considerable doubt is expressed as to the loss of the party in question, the game seems to thin. The police are still investigating, however.

First District Court.

Before Judge Henderson at Ogden yesterday:

When court was convened yesterday morning, William West and William Marshall were brought forward to plead an indictment found against each charging them with grand larceny. They waived statutory time and plead not guilty. They were remanded back to the Penitentiary to await trial which is set for the 22d.

The People etc. vs. Joseph Raymond. Defendant having plead guilty to the crime of forgery, the court sentenced him to three years in the Penitentiary on the first count and suspended sentence on the second.

J. W. Maxfield vs. Joseph A. West et al.; motion for new suit argued and taken under advisement.

Esther C. Hendrickson was before the grand jury yesterday morning, but refused to testify, claiming a right of privilege as the legal wife of the defendant. The court was inclined to that view Friday evening, but when the case was brought to his notice yesterday morning he sentenced the lady to the Penitentiary until such time as she saw fit to answer. The law, as expressed by an attorney, is that if she is the legal wife of the defendant she can testify or not, as it suits her. The question was propounded to establish the fact whether she was the legal wife or not.
