## BOEHM RECORD IS REASSURING

### New York Aero Club Confident Specially Equipped America Can Make Trip.

New York, July 14.—The record made on Saturday last by Reinhold Boehm at Johannisthal when he remained in the air for 24 hours and 12 minutes and flew 1,350 miles, has caused members of the Aero Club to feel more confident that Lieutenant Porte will accomplish his proposed trans-Atlantic flight in the aircraft America.

Boehm used an ordinary biplane in his flight, and the fact that it was not equipped for an endurance test is an indication according to Henry Woodhouse of the Aero Club that the America, with her special equipment, will be able to carry Lieutenant Porte to the Azores without mishap.

The route to be followed by Lieutenant Porte to the Azores is 1,140 miles, or some 210 miles less than the distance covered by Boehm.

## NEW ALTITUDE RECORD MADE

Leipzig, July 14.—A new world's record for altitude for an aeroplane was established here today by Heinrich Oberth a German aviator who rose in his bi-plane approximately 24,608 feet, nearly four and three-quarter miles.

The official world's record, 6900 metres or approximately 22,624 feet had been established only on July 9 at Johannisthal by Otto Linnekogel, another German aviator.

## GERMAN TEAM TO ENTER CUP CONTEST

Berlin, July 14.—Oscar Kreutzer and Otto Frotzheim, the German lawn tennis players, will leave for the United States this week to represent Germany in the preliminaries of the tournament for the Dwight F. Davis international trophy.

The intervention of some prominent members of the German Lawn Tennis association who offered to pay the expenses, brought about the change in the original decision not to send a German team.

Otechakov, Russia, July 14.—Two more Russian aviators, Captain Jessapow and his mechanic, were killed today by falling with their aeroplane which collapsed during a flight.

**WHITE AND YOAKUM BOUT.**  
Denver, Colo., July 14.—Charlie White of Chicago and Stanley Yoakum of Denver will meet here tonight in a twenty-round boxing contest. Both men will weigh in at slightly under 133 pounds.

In sporting circles added interest is taken in the match because of White's recent favorable showing in Milwaukee against Willis Ritchie, former lightweight champion. White was favorite in the betting.

"It's true," said Kaufman, "we can't come back. A man does not seem to realize until it is all over that he is through."

**CHICAGO GRAIN**  
Chicago, July 14.—South Dakota reports of heavy damage from black rust steeled the wheat market today in the face of bearish cables. The amount of territory affected by the plague seemed to have been considerably widened and it was said that in the districts where the rust prevailed the durum wheat was the only variety which had escaped harm. Opening prices which were a shade to 1-4@3-8c lower were followed by

a recovery to last night's level. Predictions of rain weakened corn. Selling pressure, however, was not heavy. After opening 1-2c off to 3-8c up the market underwent a decline all around.

Oats sagged with corn. The July option, especially suffered from lack of support. Enlarged receipts of hoes made provisions ease off. Lard held up better than pork or ribs.

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**RASPUTIN NOT DEAD.**  
St. Petersburg, July 14.—The report that Gregory Rasputin, the monk and adviser of the emperor of Russia, had died from the wound inflicted on him recently by the woman in Pokrovsky, his native village in Tobolsk, Siberia, was unfounded. The monk was conveyed by steamer to Tyumen, accompanied by the governor of the province, the bishop of Tobolsk and two doctors.
