

NEW HAVEN MEN ARE STIRRED UP

Morgan Denies Charges—Directors and President Refuse to Discuss Report.

PROSECUTORS WAITING

Commission Branded as Political Tribunal—Officials to Retaliate Against U. S. Action.

New York, July 14.—While J. P. Morgan and company consistently refused to discuss the report of the interstate commerce commission severely censuring the decision under the administration of Charles S. Melien for "reckless and profligate corporations," may cost stockholders from \$55,000,000 to \$90,000,000, J. P. Morgan himself denies the charge that the commission's examiners were not accorded full access to the firm's books bearing on the New Haven. Correspondence made public at Washington, told of Commissioner McChord's directing the chief examiners to cease the work as it "was useless."

J. P. Morgan's Reply. Late last night Mr. Morgan issued this statement in reply: "The information with regard to the withdrawal of the interstate commerce commission's examiners from the examination of the books of our firm is the first intimation that I have had that they have been recalled."

The New Haven situation is now out of the hands of the interstate commerce commission and what action, if any, is taken on the recommendations that the railroads be prosecuted lies with the department of justice and the district attorneys in the states in which the New Haven has lines.

The prosecuting attorneys at New York, Boston, Hartford, New Haven, New London and other points had received no copies of the evidence today. It is understood, however, that copies are on the way.

District Attorney Whitman who has been in Newport was expected here today.

Directors Refuse to Talk.

Directors and former directors of the road generally have refused to discuss the commission's report. Mr. Melien, however, under whose administration the alleged acts complained of were committed, branded it as "a report of a political tribunal made for political purposes."

The full board of the present New Haven directors is to meet in New York on Thursday. At that time some statement bearing on the charges may be issued.

President Melien Defended.

Mr. Melien's counsel, J. W. McCrim issued a statement defending Melien's actions. He said that Melien's private fortune when he took charge of the New Haven was a million dollars. Now, he added, it was far less than that. He added that if the government or the stockholders bring action against the directors of the New Haven railroad as suggested by the commission, the directors would retaliate with what he termed an "affirmative action in which the other action would be nullified and much do the credit of Mr. Melien and the directors would be established."

BUILDERS DESCRIBE CITY OF FUTURE

REWARD FOR MISSING SISTER

Atlanta, Ga., July 13.—Four hundred dollars reward for the finding of Mrs. Elois Nelms Dennis and Miss Beatrice Nelms, dead or alive, was offered here today by Mrs. John W. Nelms, wealthy mother of the missing woman, who disappeared mysteriously while on a trip to Texas.

The belief grew today that the death message received by Mrs. Nelms last Tuesday from San Francisco may be true. It was signed with Mrs. Dennis' name and indicated she had killed her sister in New Orleans, was preparing to kill her brother, Marshall Nelms, in San Francisco, and would then commit suicide. The letter was typewritten but Mrs. Nelms believes the handwritten signature to be genuine.

TINY HEIRESS IS DROWNED IN POOL

Philadelphia, July 13.—Nancy Carpenter, 2-year-old heiress to millions and niece of United States Senator Henry A. DuPont, of Delaware, was drowned today in a shallow pool on the estate of her uncle, Pierre S. DuPont, at Kennett Square, near here.

CROKER TO TRY TO OUST MURPHY

New York, July 13.—Harry W. Walker said today that Richard Croker is coming home in the fall to join the fight to oust Charles F. Murphy as Tammany chief.

Walker, who just returned from a visit to the former head of Tammany hall near Dublin, added: "Mr. Croker has in his possession confessions which he will make public, which will have an important bearing on his fight against Murphy. He means to make it a knockout punch for Murphy."

Walker said former Judge of Police William S. Devery would meet Croker and help in the anti-Murphy fight.

John A. Hennessy, who spent a day with Richard Croker in Ireland a month ago, said tonight: "Mr. Croker is not coming here to fight Murphy. He told me it would be of no use for him to do so. At the same time he said victory for the Democratic party in New York state would be impossible so long as Murphy continued the leader."

CAPTAIN KILLS WHOLE FAMILY

Oran, Algeria, July 13.—Crazed by a vision of his wife and three children tortured by Arabs, Captain Gouze, of the Foreign Legion seized a pistol and killed them as they slept in an effort to have them from horrors

worse than death. He then shot and killed himself.

The captain left a letter saying that he had suffered from hallucinations of ever increasing force for some months. The last and most vivid passed as quickly as the others and he was confronted with the bodies of his victims.

Overcome by grief, he resolved to join his family in death and fired a bullet through his brain.

RUSH ORDERS FOR 31,000 RAT TRAPS

New Orleans, La., July 13.—More than 31,000 traps will be used in the war of extermination on the 400,000 rats blamed for the spread of the bubonic plague here, it was announced today. Rush orders have already been placed for this number of traps and they will be used as soon as received.

Dr. William C. Rucker, assistant surgeon general of the United States public health service who is in charge of the plague eradication work has also arranged with the port commissioners for the ratproofing of the entire water front.

No deaths from bubonic plague occurred today and no new cases were reported.

CLUBMAN SHOT BY COMPANION

San Francisco, July 14.—Mistaken in the thick underbrush by his hunting companion, Elmer Cox Jr., as a deer A. J. Francis, a well known club man of this city was shot and dangerously wounded last Sunday in Madiera county. Word of the accident was received here today.

Assisted by their hunting guide, Cox and a fellow hunter, they succeeded in getting Francis to a hospital 25 miles from their camp, the trip occupying more than thirty hours.

The child was the daughter of R. M. Carpenter, a banker of Wilmington Del. The accident happened during the absence of the child's nurse.

FAILURE TO PROVIDE CHARGES.

Provo, July 13.—William Bullock of American Fork was taken before Precinct Justice E. L. Jones today on a complaint made by his wife, Mary Bullock, charging failure to provide Thursday was set for the preliminary examination.

BIGGEST PIECE OF ORDNANCE

Washington, July 14.—When its breech-loading device has been perfected at Watertown arsenal, the great 16-inch gun, the biggest piece of ordnance in the world which has just been shipped from Sandy Hook proving grounds, will be practically ready for service on the Panama canal fortifications. The carriage for this giant gun is now under construction at the Watertown, Mass., arsenal. It probably will be taken back to Sandy Hook for tests after being mounted and will not be shipped to Panama before next spring.

Some idea may be gotten of the tremendous power of this gun, designed to protect the Pacific entrance to the Panama canal, by the fact that it is fifty feet long, weighs 142 tons and fires a projectile about six feet long. The projectile itself weighs a ton and is discharged by 665 pounds of powder. It requires eight men to carry the powder charge. This gun has a maximum range of from twenty-two to twenty-three miles or half the distance between New York City and West Point. The elevation permitted by its carriage will enable the

gun to fire a projectile about eleven miles across the Pacific ocean. It has sufficient power, theoretically, to pierce two feet of the best armor plate at the muzzle. At eleven miles the gun is calculated to pierce a 12-inch armor plate, or any side armor float.

When a shell leaves the gun it is revolving around its axis at about four thousand revolutions per minute and develops a pressure of 28,000 pounds to the square inch. The pressure to the rear on the gun and forward on the projectile amounts to 7,000,000 pounds. The projectile's velocity of 2,250 feet per second gives it muzzle energy of somewhat more than 84 foot tons—that is, an energy capable of raising 42 tons one foot every second.

Army ordnance officers believe this gun will be a tremendous instrument of peace when it is finally in position on the Panama canal.

ROUND-UPS TO BE HELD NEXT YEAR

The Utah Agricultural college will conduct "Round-ups" at four places next year. This was decided upon by President Widsoe, and Dr. Peterson at a recent conference. The places so far chosen, and the dates upon which the meetings will be held are as follows: Richfield, January 4 to 10; Logan, January 18 to 20; Cedar City, February 1 to 10. The progressive little town of Milford in Beaver county is making a strong effort to secure the fourth meeting which is expected for February 15 to 27.

Professor Bailey, the foremost authority on agriculture in the United States, and editor of the famous "Rural Science Series," has expressed his desire to be present at these meetings.

While an instructor at the Cornell University School of Agriculture, the night of the present faculty of the Utah institution came under his influence. He likes to speak of these men as his "boys" and says it would give him great pleasure to visit them

and observe their work. The men who are numbered in this family are: Dr. Frank Harris, Dr. R. J. Evans, Dr. C. N. Jensen, president of the B. Y. C.; Dr. L. B. Bacheiler, Dr. George R. Hill, Dr. E. G. Peterson, Prof. John T. Caine, Prof. J. C. Hognesen and Prof. R. B. West.

The annual "Round-ups" have demonstrated their practicability by the great increase in attendance which has accompanied them the past few years. Last year the attendance at these meetings made a total of 2,088 individuals proportionately divided between the following towns at which meetings were held: Logan, Richfield and Cedar City. The long list of eminent agriculturists who are being engaged for this year will be appreciated undoubtedly by the farmers and housewives who attended last year or who contemplate attending the coming sessions.

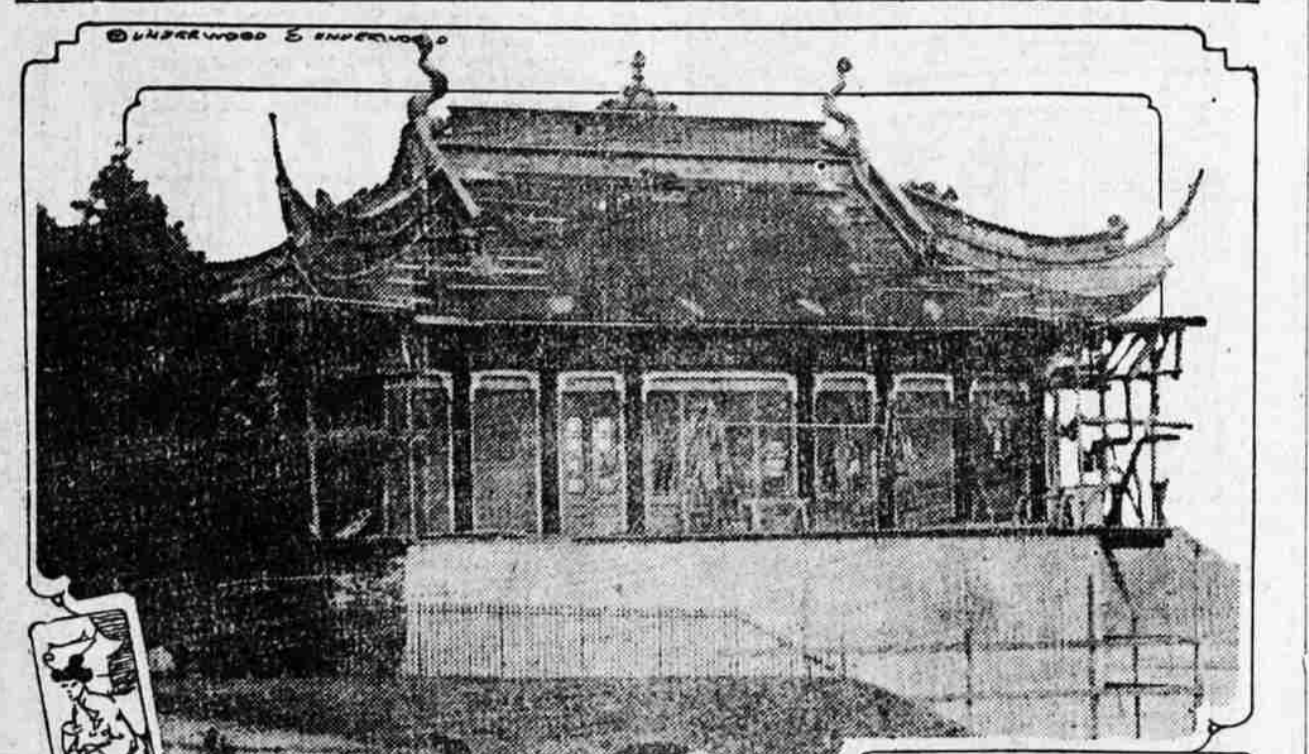

T. D. JONES WILL BE CONFIRMED

Majority Ranging From Five to Ten for Chicago Man Is Assured.

Washington, July 14.—Administration senators after a canvass today reported to the White House that President Wilson's nomination of Thomas D. Jones of Chicago, to the federal reserve board would be confirmed by a majority ranging from five to ten.

There were no developments in the nomination of Paul W. Warburg of New York. Indications were that the White House would not begin the fight for his confirmation until after Mr. Jones had been placed.

The fight on Jones was carried into the senate by acting Chairman Hitchcock of the banking committee, leading the opposition. Because of Mr. Jones' connection with the so-called Zinc and Harvester trusts. With administration supporters predicting a victory, the fight went on behind closed doors.

HEAP OF SCRAP IRON HIS MEMORIAL

Junction City, Kan., July 14.—Thousands of pieces of scrap iron from the memorial that John Rush left when he died at his home near here yesterday. For years he followed a hobby of collecting scrap iron, as many a weathered man collected paintings. He never refused to buy a piece of iron and persistently refused to sell it. He died at his home at Junction City. At the time of his death he had a junk pile forty feet high covering several acres of his farm.

HAILSTORM DOES GREAT DAMAGE

North Yakima, Wash., July 14.—Damage estimated at \$75,000 was caused by hail late yesterday in an area two miles square near here. Fruit in the area was destroyed, poultry and some pigs were killed and cattle and horses were severely injured.

A like storm Sunday in Sherman county, Ore. is reported to have done damage estimated at \$100,000, destroying thousands of acres of grain.

New York, July 14.—Heavy selling of New Haven forced that stock to the new low level of 54 1/4 in the course of today's early session. The balance of the list was extremely feverish.

He cites the Claffin receivership and various other failures as proving that the market must be sound to bear up under them.
