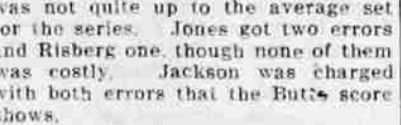

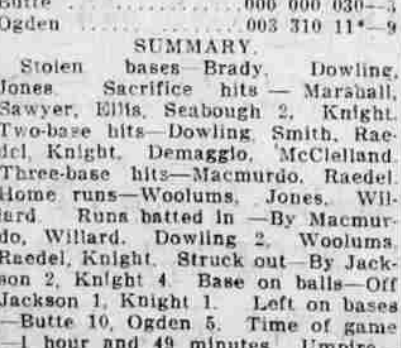

BAKER AND COBB TOP BATTING LIST

Chicago, July 25—"Home Run" Baker of Philadelphia has pounded his way into a tie for the batting leadership of the American league. According to averages published here today, Baker and Cobb of Detroit are setting the pace at a rate of .342. In the first tie also are Jackson, Cleveland, 327; Leonard, Boston, with 13 and 3; Bender, Philadelphia, 8 and 2; and Plank, Philadelphia, 10 and 3.

Grant of New York tops the National league race with .342. Next come Becker, Philadelphia, .326; Dalton, Brooklyn, .321; Eyrne, Philadelphia, .315; Meyers, New York, .310; Wingo, St. Louis, .305; Phelan, Chicago, .304; Burns, New York, .302; Hummel, Brooklyn, .297; Archer, Chicago, .292; Burns, Philadelphia, .292. Brooklyn is ahead in club batting with .266 and New York next with .263. Herzog, Cincinnati, leads in stolen bases with thirty-five. Mathewson, New York, with 17 and 4; Vaughn, Chicago, with 11 and 4; Donk, St. Louis, with 9 and 4, hold pitching honors.

Kanff, Indianapolis, leads the Federals with 288 and Baltimore with 277, lead the clubs. Pitching leadership is held by Katsiringer, Indianapolis, with 9 wins and 2 defeats; Ford, Buffalo, with 12 and 5; and Seaton, Brooklyn, with 16 and 7.

In the American association, Titus, Kansas City, leads with .393. Cleveland with .278 leads the clubs. Killebrew, with 278 leads the base stealers. Top notch pitchers are Dougherty, Milwaukee, with 9 and 2; Galla, Kansas City, 15 and 4; and Lary, Indianapolis, 10 and 3.

Larry Lejeune continues the Western league leader with 409. Next to him are Jordan, Lincoln, 354; Conzation, Omaha, 345; Edgington, Denver, 344; Paterson, St. Joseph, 343; Kane, Sioux City, 342; Shaw, Des Moines, 339; Koerner, Topeka, 329; Butcher, Denver, 329; Earger, Omaha, 329. Leading the pitchers are Scroggins, St. Joseph, and Gasper, Sioux City, with 13 and 4 each; Gaskel, Denver, with 15 and 5.

In the Southern association, McCormick retains the lead with .360. Chattanooga and Mobile are tied for club batting leadership with .271 each; Hogg, Mobile, with 16 and 6; Harding, Chattanooga, with 13 and 5; and Townsend, Mobile, with 12 and 5 lead the pitchers.

Kritchell, Toronto, with 354 leads in the International league. Baltimore and Providence lead the clubs with 270 each. In stolen bases Gibley, Buffalo, is the leader with 24. Top notch pitchers include Bader, Buffalo, with 9 and 3; Hughes, Rochester, 13 and 5; and Ruth, Baltimore, 14 and 6.

THREE HOME RUNS DO NOT WIN THE GAME

Salt Lake, July 27.—Jimmy Caveney batted in all of Salt Lake's runs yesterday which numbered four. This he did with three lusty clouts over the fence, once with a runner on the bags. One of Caveney's drives was over the inclosing works at the farthest corner of centerfield and was one of the longest drives ever made from Lucas field.

The oldest inhabitant of the baseball park—a daily frequenter surely is an inhabitant—says Caveney's stickwork yesterday sets a record in that nobody ever before performed to the extent of three homers in a single day.

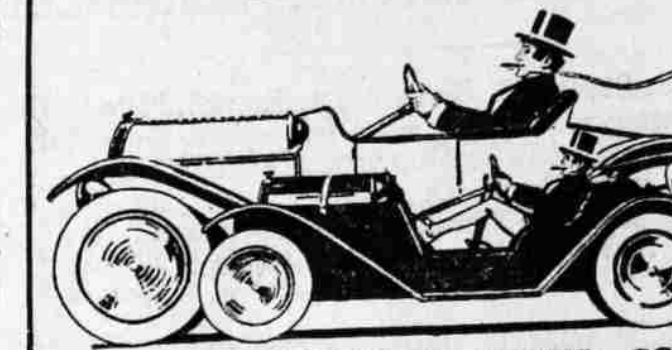
