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ELECTION RESULTS IN THE NATION. Democracy in the nation has had a narrow escape. The overwhelming congressional majority of the party has been cut to a very narrow margin and two-thirds of the northern states, which two years ago went Democratic, have returned to the Republican party.

NEW EXPERTS IN THE GOVERNMENT SERVICE. The Civil Service commission has accepted a novel method of obtaining experts for government service. This method consists in securing statements regarding education, experience and general fitness for the work, made by the applicant at home or wherever he may be most convenient.

THE RE-ELECTION OF SENATOR SMOOT. Senator Smoot undoubtedly is re-elected, although by a comparatively close margin. LATIN-AMERICA SHOULD BE STUDIED. Special study of the countries of Latin-America in schools in the United States is urged by Dr. P. P. Claxton, Commissioner of Education, in a letter to high-school principals. Dr. Claxton declares:

"We should teach in our schools and colleges more of the geography, history, literature, and life of the Latin-American countries, and we should offer instruction in the Spanish and Portuguese languages to a much larger extent than is now done."

BRITISH MEET WITH SURPRISE. German Raiding Squadron Within Ten Miles of English Coast Before Discovered. FIGHT NEAR SHORE. Splendid Seamanship of British Captain Saves Cruiser From Defeat.

London, Nov. 4, 4:45 a. m.—Telegraphing from Yarmouth regarding the raid made by a German squadron in the North sea Tuesday, the correspondent of the Times says: "The whole of the crew of submarine D-5, which was sunk by a mine dropped by a German cruiser, were lost except two officers and two men. Four men were saved from the drifter Fraternal, which also was sunk, but six of her men were drowned. The mine drifter Copious also was struck by a mine about the same time as the others and sank. Only one member of her crew was saved, and nine were drowned."

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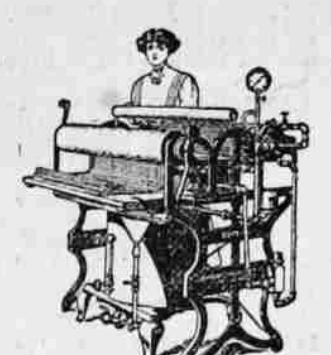
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
