CONTRACT FOR THE MOVING PICTURES

Ogden is to receive publicity throughout the country by 1000 feet of moving pictures taken of the city and its vicinity. The directors of the Ogden Publicity bureau passed resolutions today authorizing the same.

A special meeting was arranged by O. J. Stillwell to take place at the Isis theater today at 11:30 o'clock at which members of the Publicity bureau directorate, the Weber club and others were present.

At the conclusion of the exhibition, all present agreed that, if the little city of Sherman could furnish so much material in a film 1000 feet long, Ogden would be a poor town if a reel of much higher class could not be produced here.

The scenes and industries of Sherman are unfolded by means of the simple expedient of having the film tell the story of a party of young ladies on a visit to the city. They are accompanied over the city to the schools, churches and manufacturing establishments and interest to the pictures is secured by means of their movements.

The scenes displayed proved exceedingly interesting to the audience and it was pointed out that, if Sherman with no background of mountains or foliage to speak of, can produce such an interesting film, Ogden with its canyon, farms and buildings should make a far more attractive picture.

The high school might be given prominence by reproducing a drill of the cadets and there are other scenes that could be enlivened in much the same manner, and it has been suggested that the film be taken during the spring carnival when a novel parade may be pictured to add interest.

DISEASES ARE KEPT SECRET BY DOCTORS

The physicians do not report all diseases that should come to the attention of the health inspector and consequently are guilty of misdemeanors is the declaration of Sanitary Inspector George Shorten.

"Sanitary conditions in many respects could be bettered if the physicians would report such diseases," said Mr. Shorten today. "In many instances where typhoid occurs there are conditions to be remedied and the health of the community can be better protected when such reports are made."

Referring to the statute that requires physicians and hospitals to report cases of venereal diseases, he said that no such reports are now made and that often, persons suffering of such diseases are engaged in occupations that endanger the health of others.

Each physician is furnished with blanks to report such cases and the physician is required to give all information concerning the disease but the name of the patient is not required. The blanks also urge the physician to explain the contagious principles of venereal disease and the necessary precautions to be observed.

According to Inspector Shorten, there does not appear to be any reason to be alarmed in Ogden over the number of cases of infantile paralysis or spinal meningitis that have been reported elsewhere.

The measles situation does not abate to any extent. There are sixty-four homes in the city under quarantine, though many homes are released each day.

Five families are under quarantine with smallpox and twelve cases of chickenpox are reported.

There does not appear to be any district of the city where the measles situation is better than a few weeks ago. From the addresses on the books, the cases are scattered over the entire city.
