## LOGAN HAS AUTO CAMPING PARK

Site for Public Grounds Located and Will Be Made Ready at Once

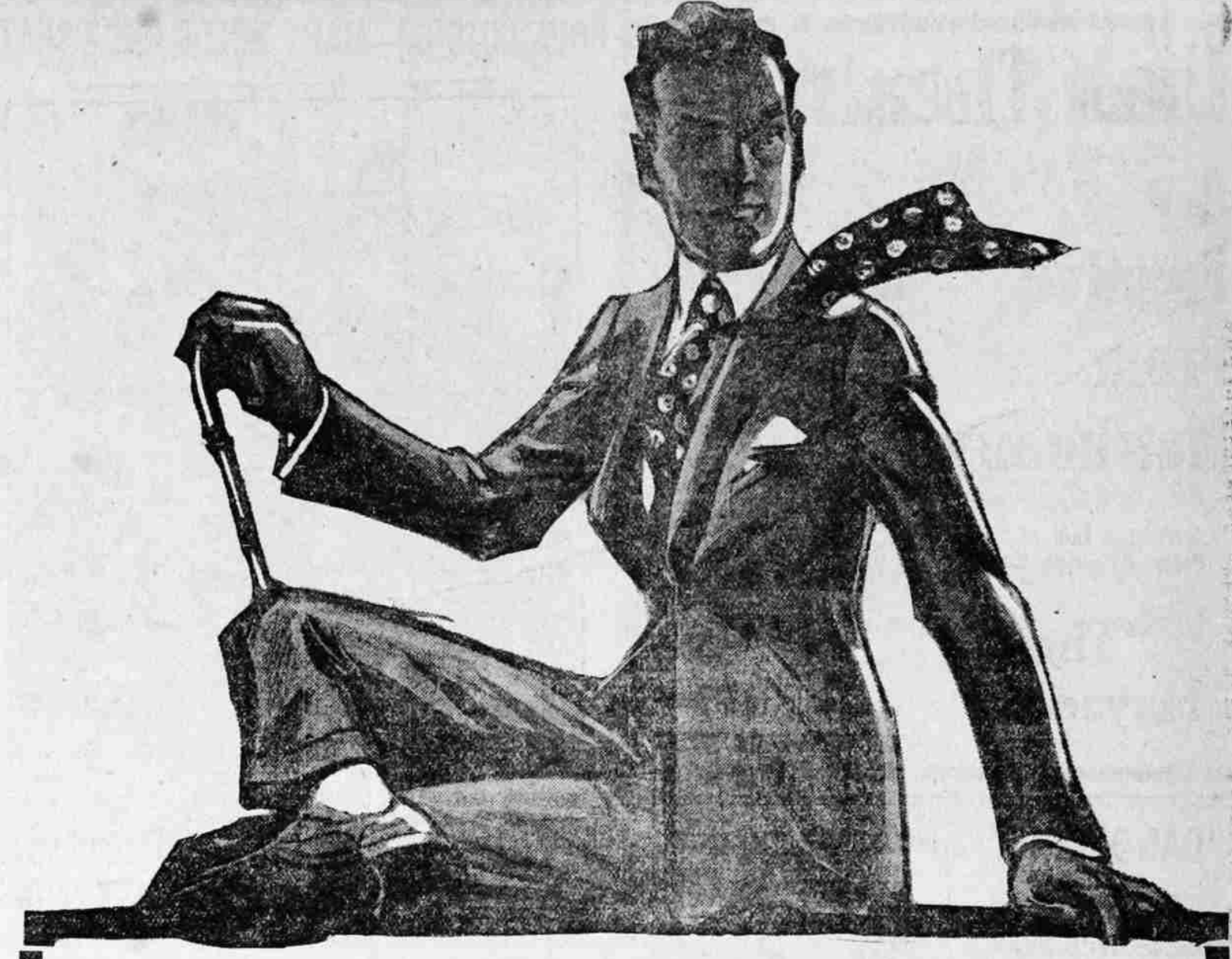
LOGAN, June 11.—A site for a public camping ground for Logan City has been selected by the auto camping committee of the Chamber of Commerce and this will be rapidly put into shape to accommodate the heavy summer tourist traffic, according to Secretary Merwin Hovey of the Logan Chamber of Commerce.

The site chosen by the committee is commonly known as Johnson's grove. It is on the main paved highway just south of the Logan river bridge. While final arrangements have not been made with the owners of the property, these will be completed immediately and the grove will be put into proper condition.

Johnson's grove will make an excellent camping ground for auto tourists says Mr. Hovey. It is well covered with lawns and large shade trees, has running water and wood for fires available and is on the state highway entering Logan on the south. Every effort will be made to make it ideal for tourist traffic.

A permanent auto camping ground for Logan has also been decided upon, says Mr. Hovey, but it will be a year or more before this can be made ready. The permanent camp is to be on Logan's main street, one block from the business district, near the post-office, garages and laundries, and the proposed site for the city hall and Carnegie public library. It will be sown to grass, trees will be planted, water mains laid and washing stations, lavatories, etc., will be installed. Lights will be arranged for and electric power for cooking, oil will also be available.

"We could not have found a better place for a permanent camping ground than the one selected," says Mr. Hovey. "It will be close to town, an excellent point from which side trips can be made to the Utah Agricultural college, Logan and Blacksmith Fork canyons, and will be on the through road to Yellowstone National park. The Chamber of Commerce and the Logan City commission will co-operate in putting the camping ground in shape. We expect to have one of the most beautiful little spots in the state when we are through."

## COLLEGE BOYS IN TOUGH LUCK

Five Arrested as Vags Tell Tale That Wins Them Freedom

Another episode of the adventures of the "Prune Pickers Quintette" was registered last night when Detectives Everett Noble and William Taylor arrested the five on a vagrancy charge.

The quintette rendered popular melodies behind the bars and disturbed slumbers of other inmates of "Hotel de Gink"—and they sang well, the late shift officers said.

This morning, when hailed before Judge D. R. Roberts of the city court, the boys looked like they might have been hoboes of the worst description. Remnants of army clothing, a pair of bell bottom seaman's trousers, just plain pants and condescending sweaters and overcoats were worn by the men.

They were headed for "Uncle Henry's" ranch at Douglas, Wyo., and had started out from San Francisco with plenty of money, and a Ford car as a means of locomotion. The car progressed in an erratic fashion, one of the boys stated. "We would push the Ford up one side of a hill and then coast down the other side." Finally the hills became too frequent so, abandoning the Ford, they took to the "bumpers."

The boys were expecting money from home today.

Three of them were students of the Santa Clara university in California. Upon recommendation of City Attorney Samuel Powell they were dismissed.

## GREAT GAMBLING HALL IS CLOSED

Shanghai's Notorious 'Wheel' Was Largest in the Far East

(Correspondence.)

SHANGHAI, June 11.—The great gambling establishment in this city notorious for years under the name of "The Wheel," which originally cost more than \$500,000, is to be converted into a charity hospital. The Chinese authorities have announced that they intend to confiscate the huge building which now stands dark and empty. Its owners, however, threaten to fight this program.

Up to about three years ago when the place was closed by Chinese authorities, "The Wheel" in Shanghai was one of the biggest gambling establishments in the Far East. It was located in Chinese territory on North Homan road, a 15-minute automobile ride from the heart of the city. In the days when the establishment flourished, three roulette wheels with six layouts, beside Faro and other games were operated.

After this establishment was closed as the result of the efforts of missionary interests no open gambling on any large scale was permitted in Shanghai until last fall when the interests that formerly operated "The Wheel" opened near it a smaller roulette establishment which in turn was closed after a few weeks.

Experiments have been conducted at Vancouver, B. C., toward building houses from marble dust and sawdust, at a cost of about 6 cents a foot.
