A. C. Summer School Students Hear Child

LOGAN, June 11.—Superintendent Geo. N. Child was in Logan yesterday to address the summer school students at the Agricultural college. His remarks were addressed to a large audience of teachers at the usual Thursday 12 o'clock assembly. Superintendent Child emphasized the chance of service to be rendered in the teaching profession, a service to be found nowhere else, and gave promise of bright prospects for the teacher's future. He struck the keynote of his message when he said that teachers desire success in their work. Illustrating from the experimental work of Dr. Rice, he pointed out the factors which are to be found in all successful schools and school teachers. Home environment, size of class, the age of student, and home study do not necessarily make for success. Success only comes where the institution and teacher has a definite knowledge of what they want to accomplish, where the standards are aimed to reach an ideal. It is important that the subject matter be taught, but the objective is the important thing. Methods and improved methods of presentation will naturally follow.

Files Suit to Recover on Promissory Note

Simon H. Slate this morning filed suit in the district court against C. E. Munson, Ada Munson and G. G. Parker to recover \$400 alleged to be due on a promissory note executed March 15, 1917. Federal Vocational Board Here June 19

Seeking soldiers, sailors or marines who, through injury or sickness during the time they were in service, are entitled to compensation, the travelling case board of the federal board of vocational training will arrive in Ogden June 19 and will establish themselves in the offices of the home service bureau of the Red Cross, in the First National bank building. The object of the board's visit is to get personally in touch with the injured soldier and investigate his case so that decision can be given on the spot.

RED CROSS TO CONTINUE WORK Measures for Civilian Relief to Be Taken Up, Says Official Here

Miss Nell B. Holsinger, representing the division office of the Rocky Mountain Chapter of the Red Cross, with offices at Denver, arrived in Ogden yesterday to take up work connected with the peace time program of the organization to which she belongs. Miss Holsinger stated that the purpose of the Red Cross in its peace time program was to extend relief to families and members of families of civilians, practically the same assistance as was extended the families of soldiers or service men during the world war.

Bishop Moulton to Speak Here Sunday

The Rt. Rev. Arthur W. Moulton, D. D., missionary bishop of Utah, will make his first official visitation to the Church of the Good Shepherd, Ogden, next Sunday morning. He will preach the sermon at the 11 o'clock service and will administer the apostolic rite of confirmation to a class of candidates to be presented by the rector, the Rev. John W. Hyslop. Officers and members of the church will also be presented informally to the visitor.

The object is specially to discuss college and "Y" problems. Wristley, Bell and West will represent the local "Y" and Porter the student body at the student body presidents' and editors' conference.

Former Ogden Woman Is Dead at Kemmerer

Mrs. May Peak Christensen, former Ogden woman, died at the Kemmerer hospital yesterday, according to word reaching Ogden this morning. She was formerly a telephone girl. Burial will take place in Salt Lake Sunday, funeral services to be held in the Third Ward chapel.

Davis Under Bond; Wife Desertion Is Charged

Sheriff H. C. Peterson and Deputy Sheriff Dick Wootton returned to Ogden yesterday afternoon after a trip to Price where Harold D. Davis, arrested on a charge of deserting his wife and child here, was being held. The prisoner was not returned to Ogden, however, but was released after furnishing bond of \$500 for his appearance at the trial which will be held in the district court here.

VERMONT DELEGATES ASK ACTION ON SUFFRAGE
