BRISK TRADING ON SALT LAKE EXCHANGE

Plutus and New Quincy Two Most Active Stocks—Tintic Standard Weaker

The trading today on the Salt Lake Stock & Mining Exchange was very active with Plutus and New Quincy being the two most active stocks, the former opening at 38 1/2 cents and selling down to 35 cents, it closing with the stock offered at this price, while the latter was the heaviest trader of the day, 36,000 shares changing hands from 8 to 8 1/2 cents. Sells was somewhat weaker it selling down to 16 1/2 cents, Columbus Rexall opened strong but weakened before the close, it selling as low as 60 cents and closed with 59 cents bid and 60 cents asked. Eureka Lily showed a little strength, it selling at 23 cents, Tintic Standard was weaker, it changing hands at 35, 60, and Walker Mining changed hands at 33.75.

Snowfall in Manti Was Below Normal

Great Basin experiment station measures of snowfall in the Manti forest, which is regarded as a typical report regarding that portion of the country, indicates that the snowfall is below normal (this February). The following figures were compiled by E. H. Storm, who has made measurements for the forest service this year: 55 inches at 10,000 elevation, 49 inches at 8750 elevation, 32 inches at 7200 elevation. The depths are below normal by approximately 12 inches, it is stated. Reports from various forest supervisors indicate that recent storms have materially relieved a poor snow situation.

WORLD'S MARKETS

NEW YORK, March 12—Regardless of another reaction in foreign exchange, the British rate especially forfelling much of its recent recovery, stocks continued their upward movement at the outset of today's session. Within the first half hour of the active trading advances of 2 to 10 points were recorded by prominent automobile shares under lead of General Motors while rails and equipments supplemented yesterday's gains by 1 to 3 points. Oils and steels made advances, extending from large fractions to 2 points and Industrial Alcohol featured the specialties rising 4 points. The break in exchange, which was attributed to demands of immediate gold imports, finally had its effect. General Motors lost most of its 10 point rise, reactions elsewhere extending from 1 to 4 points. Oils, including the low-priced ones, resisted pressure, regaining much of their 2 to 5 point gains on announcement of further advances in prices of raw and refined products. Rails, equipments and shippings followed the irregular course set by active industrials. The market rallied irregularly at noon, the seven per cent call loans rate implying easy money conditions over the week-end.

CHICAGO, March 12—Free selling led by big commission houses weakened the corn market today northward standing continued wet weather. Temporary declines in sterling counted somewhat in favor of the bears and so, too, did an advance in ocean rates on foodstuffs from the United States to Great Britain. Besides, it was asserted that corn prices were above the feeding value of the cereal. Opening quotations, which ranged from 1/2c decline to a like advance, with May 1.43 1/4 to 1.49, and July 1.42 1/4.
