

# HARDING'S COAL TALK SHOWS STEEL HAND IN VELVET GLOVE

### Hoover Declares National Strike Conference Is Making Progress; Commissions to Do Actual Work May Be Named Today

WASHINGTON, July 1.—President Harding's national coal conference, called to find a way to end the national coal strike and bring peace in the mining industry, is "making progress," it was declared tonight by Secretary of Commerce Hoover, when the conference adjourned until tomorrow.

Hoover's statement was the first official statement concerning the work of the mine parley. On the part of the miners, it was said, the conference is leading up to the organization of a functioning body capable of negotiating a settlement of the strike and that Sunday's session may result in the appointment of commissions by both the operators and miners to begin the actual wage negotiations.

**MUCH SHOUTING HEARD.**  
No word of what took place during the afternoon session was permitted to leak out but the shouting of the combatants in the coal war could be heard plainly by those in the adjoining rooms.

Miners' representatives who scanned the list of bituminous operators assembled did so with great concern, declaring informal that the majority of them were men who could be considered opposed to settlement. There was also felt some uneasiness among operators present as to the possibility of the conferees coming to any agreement.

After the general conference this afternoon Secretary of the Interior Fall met with the anthracite operators. This group adjourned to meet at 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon. It was evident the anthracite operators and miners were a functioning body with authority to discuss and agree upon a new wage scale to settle the trouble in that part of the industry.

**POWER CONCEALED.**  
Enroute to the interior department from the White House operators and miners who talked with newspaper men expressed general satisfaction with the president's remarks, but stated they had not failed to appreciate the fact that the president's advice was a steel hand in a velvet glove.

During the forenoon session, Secretary of Labor Davis delivered a brief and forceful appeal to the representatives of the mining industry that they come to an agreement for the common good of the American people as suggested by President Harding. The miners and operators adjourned at 5 o'clock this evening until 2 o'clock tomorrow.

**TEXT OF ADDRESS.**  
President Harding, in addressing the conference of coal operators and union miners' representatives today said:

"Gentlemen of the Coal Industry: I ask you to meet here together in thought that in bringing you together I might be serving both the mine workers and the mine operators of the United States, and at the same time serve the great American public. There has been instability of production, attended by uncertain deliveries, which has had reflex in speculative prices and penurious conditions, which encumbered profiteering and menaced our public services.

**PUBLIC RIGHTS FIRST.**  
"Labor has the right, capital has the right and above all else, the American public has the right to be freed from these recurring anxieties, no matter what the cause are. That freedom must be established. The government has no desire to intrude itself in the field of your activities. It does feel an obligation to see that the common American interest shall not be menaced by a protracted lack of association between the two great and essential interests—mine workers and employers—should settle this matter in a frank recognition of the mutuality of your interests. If you can not do that, then the larger public interest must be asserted in the name of the people, where the common good is the first and highest concern.

"It is pretty generally recognized that there are fundamental difficulties in present-day coal production, the solution of which is not to be found in an hour or a day of most friendly and earnest conference. The excess development of productive capacity in both tonnage available, and miners to work it has presented a situation of unworkable conditions."

**THREE MONTHS IDLE.**  
"You who are here today represent a large sponsorship for America's supply of fuel. In that sponsorship you have an indissoluble relationship to the commonwealth of America. Coal is indispensable to our life as a people, and since this country has afforded you the opportunity of development on your part, both as workers and operators, you have created, in turn, an obligation to serve. Conflicting views as to your policies and your obligations to one another in no wise modify your obligations to that public which made possible your industrial existence."

"Because of expiring agreements relating to wage scales and working conditions a large percentage of the mining activities of the country have been suspended three months to a day. It is not for me to touch upon the merits of your opposing positions. I have not called you a partisan of the mine worker or the employer. I do not mean even to discuss a single phase of controverted questions. The main point is to bring you together and in that contact of men, mindful of the necessity of righteousness in any useful and abiding relationship, to have you frankly and fairly consider your problems in their relation to the welfare of our common country."

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**HARDIEST MEN OF  
EMPIRE ARRIVE AT  
BASE OF MOUNTAIN  
'LIFERS' BURN  
MIDNIGHT OIL**

LONDON, July 1.—(By the Associated Press.)—Sir Francis Young, husband, president of the Royal Geographical society, is authority for the statement that the expedition which was to attempt the conquest of Mount Everest had left Darjiling at the end of March and had arrived at the mountain in good health. So far as the configuration of the mountain was concerned there remained no serious obstacles to oppose the climber.

"But there still remains," he added, "the incalculable factor that may prove fatal to success—the debilitating effect of high altitudes on the human constitution."

"We have sent out the hardest, pluckiest and most experienced mountaineers we can find. But can they, with all their courage and determination, skill and resource, successfully conquer the ice-capped mountain, fully covered by a raising of the air beyond 28,000 feet is certain to produce?"

**THREE HOURS DAILY**

Under these trying conditions, these prisoners are proving more capable students than regular college men and women at the state university.

Their study period is the three hour interval between the day's toll in the prison's twin plant and the big going in the "cell hole" which given them 10 minutes to doff their denim uniforms before the lights go out.

The prisoners are taking regular college courses offered by the University of Wisconsin extension division. Records of the "U" rate all of the 84 as very good scholars. Most of them have attained "excellent" in every subject. Twenty-eight have already completed the course.

On the other hand, surrounded with every facility of freedom, and in many cases, of ease, few regular students at the state university at Madison have done better or even as well as these prisoners.

**ISOLATION IS BENEFIT**

Most of the 800 men and women attending the "U" are far below the convicts in their marks. The very isolation, which is a part of the punishment of the criminal, is given by heads of the extension division as the reason for the extraordinary pace set by the prisoners. Studying is a recreation as well as work for them, and above all it holds the golden promise of leading to a new life.

The main requisite for a student is a will to learn. Once the prisoner has reached his desire in that line, there is no difficulty and with few exceptions the convicts make model students. They are interested in their subjects and are happy to continue their studies.

# OFFICERS ON WITNESS STAND

### Deputies at Christensen Trial Tell of Investigation of Shooting

Following the examination of several witnesses for the state yesterday morning, the trial of Marlow J. Christensen, former principal of the Uintah school, charged with murder for the alleged shooting of Lloyd Bybee, 18-year-old Uintah lad, was adjourned at 12:30 o'clock until Monday morning at 9:30 o'clock, by Judge James N. Kimball in the district court.

The final hours of the trial yesterday were taken up in testimony of officers who went to the scene of the shooting and who identified the revolver as that given over to them by Christensen when he gave himself up. Sheriff Richard Pincock testified that he interviewed Bybee at the hospital a day before his death and said that the lad had signed a written statement in which he gave his version of the shooting.

An attempt was made to introduce this statement in the case but it was excluded by the court.

Charles Pincock, deputy sheriff, testified he went to Uintah following the shooting and brought Christensen to the county jail. He identified the as which Christensen handed to him. Deputy Sheriff John Holden corroborated the statements of Deputy Pincock.

Dr. E. R. Durakes told of the wound alleged to have been caused by the bullet and to the condition of Bybee when in the hospital.

Byron Bybee, a cousin of Lloyd Bybee, was on the stand when the court adjourned. He said he was nearby when the shooting occurred. He will complete his testimony tomorrow.
