

TOPS HITTERS IN NORTHERN LOOP

Four Hundred Hitters
Again Make Appearance
in Average Column

FOUR HUNDRED hitters have again made their appearance in the Northern Utah league, according to averages compiled today, which include the contest played Sunday between Logan and Ogden. Four regulars are clouting .400 or better. George French, third baseman of the Ogden club is out in front with a mark of .434, supplanting Snapp of Brigham, who is second with a mark of .403. French boosted his average during the past week from .385 while Snapp raised his mark to .403 from .387.

Ernie Fallentine of Ogden and Slattery of Brigham are next in line with marks of .400 each. Kennedy of Logan is next with .377. Other leaders are: B. Johnson, Smithfield, .356; Petersen, Ogden, .345 and Young, Brigham, .333.

Menges of Brigham is first in run getting. He has collected 16. The other leaders in this department are: Clark, Brigham, 15; Kilpatrick, Ogden, Falck, Logan, and Slattery, Brigham, 12 each; Dorious, Smithfield and Petersen, Ogden, 11 each.

LEADS IN HITS
Snapp continues to top the stickers in the most hits. He is credited with 33 Fallentine of Ogden, and Slattery of Brigham, are next in line with 22 each. B. Johnson of Smithfield is fourth with 21. Kennedy of Logan and French of Ogden are next with 20 each. Young, Brigham, Clark, Brigham, and Petersen of Ogden, are next in line with 18 each.

Fallentine continues to blaze the trail in the two base department, having nine. Phillips of Logan and Slattery of Brigham are next in line with 7 each. Other leaders are: French and Clark, Ogden, Goodwin, Smithfield, Kennedy, Logan, and Menges, Brigham, 4 each.

Snelgrove of Ogden, and Kilpatrick of Ogden are tied for first honors in triples with four each. Petersen of Ogden and Kennedy of Logan are tied for third with three each.

Hansen of Smithfield continues to lead in circuit clouts. He has three tallied up. Fallentine of Ogden is second with two. Other leaders are: Dorious, Goodwin and Melvor, Smithfield, Young and Borstadt, Brigham, and Phillips, Logan, one each.

FALLENINE FIRST
Fallentine leads in total bases with 36. Slattery of Brigham, is second, with 31. B. Johnson, Smithfield and Snapp, Brigham, are tied for third, with 27 each. French of Ogden and Young of Brigham are next in line with 25 each. Petersen and Snelgrove of Ogden and Kennedy of Logan are next in line with 23 each, followed by Phillips, Logan, 22.

Petersen of the Gunners is out in front in sacrifice hits with six. Kilpatrick, Ogden, Barry, Brigham and Dorious, Smithfield, are tied for second with three each.

Menges of the Peaches easily tops the stolen base artists. He has eight to his credit. Jarvis of Logan is second with five. Petersen and Snelgrove of Ogden are credited with four each. Other leaders in this department are: French and Kilpatrick; Fallentine, Ogden, Falck and Nelson, Logan, and Goodwin, Smithfield, three, each.

The Gunners again top the loop in hitting with a mark of .303. Brigham is second, Smithfield third and Logan fourth.

MICHIGAN CITY IN SPOT LIGHT

Fans Gather and Watch
Leonard Defend Light-
weight Title

MICHIGAN CITY, Ind., July 3.—(By the Associated Press)—This thriving little city with a lightweight championship bout on its hands began to fill up today with the first of the fight fans for the ten-round contest between Benny Leonard, the title holder and Rocky Kansas, the Buffalo challenger, in the afternoon. The arena tomorrow afternoon. Indications are that 25,000 ring fans will pay approximately \$75,000 to see the fight.

The advance sale indicates a capacity crowd for the concrete bowl which has been built within a stone's throw of Lake Michigan for the bout.

Both Leonard and the three times challenger for the lightweight crown virtually ended their training Sunday. Neither will do any more work with the gloves until they climb through the ropes tomorrow. Leonard finished his boxing Sunday without injury to his hands and is ready to set a furious pace for the Buffalo challenge.

While Leonard is confident of winning, he nevertheless has deep respect for the hard hitting Kansas. Rocky always has given Leonard the most desperate sort of battle. He is so short and stocky and can rip in with a short left to the body that it is dangerous. He has an attack that always has worried his opponents, and with the exception of Leonard, recently has floored almost every man who faced him in the ring.

Kansas probably will face a weight disadvantage of about five pounds tomorrow. The champion plans to go into the ring at about 137 pounds, while Kansas probably will not scale more than 133 or 134 pounds, which is his best weight.

SEVEN KILLED, 75 HURT IN WRECK

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., July 3.—At least seven persons were killed and about 75 others injured, half of them seriously, early today when a Camden, Atlantic City express train left the rails at Winslow Junction, 27 miles from here. There were reports that nearly twenty persons were killed, but officials of the Philadelphia and Reading announced only seven.

The train split a switch at the Cape May crossover and plunged perhaps 40 feet down a deep embankment. The engine and five coaches were piled up at the bottom, a complete wreck.

GRAIN ELEVATORS GO UP IN SMOKE

BALTIMORE, Md., July 3.—Lightning Sunday struck the roof of one of the several great grain elevators at the Baltimore and Ohio railroad terminals at Locust Point and in a few minutes the immense structure was in flames.

The fire spread rapidly, soon enveloping elevators B and C and pier 5, all of which were wrecked. The elevators contained over 600,000 bushels of grain, which with sixty carloads of export tobacco on the pier, was destroyed. The railroad company's loss is estimated at between \$1,500,000 and \$1,000,000. Several firemen were injured.

SENATE FORCED TO TAKE RECESS

Republican Leaders Look
for Definite Plan on Tariff
Bill This Week

WASHINGTON, July 3.—The senate, unable to have a quorum today, was forced to recess until Wednesday after it disapproved a tariff rate of 5 cents a pound on unshelled almonds. A vote on the committee rate of 15 cents a pound on shelled almonds went over.

This week is to develop some definite plan as to the fate of the tariff bill in the senate, according to a decision today by Republican leaders in informal conferences.

It was announced that the Republican motion to curb debate on the bill in circulation about ten days would be presented in the senate Wednesday and voted on Friday.

That the necessary two-thirds vote for cloture need not be secured was probable, according to the sponsors of the petition. Several Democrats were said to favor cloture but the party as a whole was expected to line up generally against it.

The roll call on the cloture move, Republican leaders said, would at least demand a desire on the part of the majority to bring the bill to an early vote.

If substantial progress was not made on the bill, they were prepared to lay it aside, and make a vigorous fight for the proposed new cloture rule, recommended recently by two Republican conferences, to invoke cloture by majority instead of a two-thirds vote.
