

Emyras Morgan will escape further prosecution for an alleged statutory of-fense, upon a technicality. In the trial court Morgan was discharged upon the technicality that the complaint against him was faulty in that it charged him technicality that the complaint against him was faulty, in that it charged him with committing a statutory offense against an entirely different person. The name of Morgan's alleged victim, it appears, was misspelled. The state appealed to the supreme court, which Monday dismissed the appeal and Morgan will go free.
