WORK ON STRAWBERRY; ISSUE WILL STAND IT

Special to The Tribune. PROVO, March 5.—When asked today what effect the bill which has passed the senate of the United States would have on the work under his charge, Engineer J. L. Lytle of the Strawberry Irrigation project said: "The bill which has now gone to the house for their consideration provides for the sale of \$20,000,000 worth of certificates, the money to be used for the reclamation service, if it becomes a law, and will enable the bureau to finish the Strawberry project a year or more earlier than has been estimated under the present system of appropriations by congress.

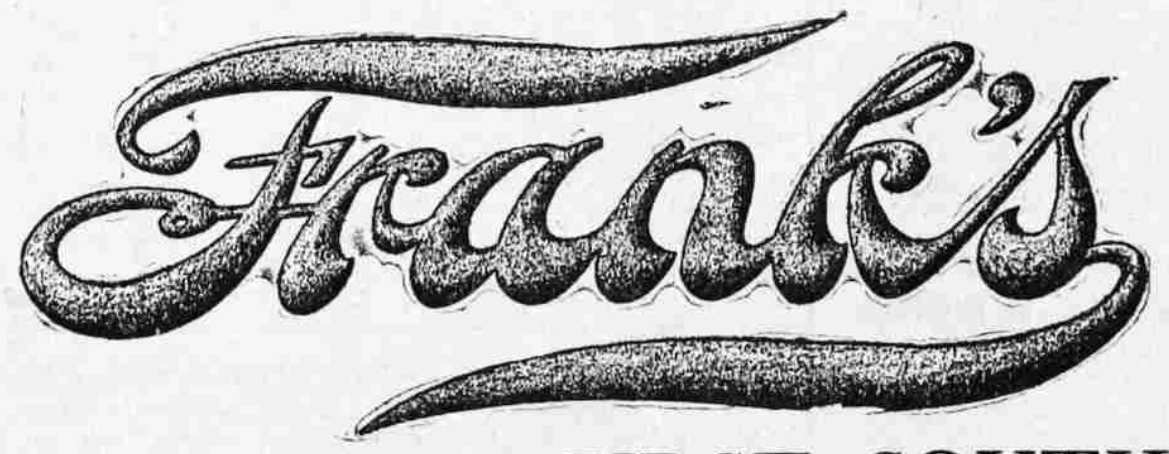
