Presbyterian Assembly Goes on Record Against Picture of Young on Silver Service.

INTEREST IN HERESY TRIAL OF DR. GRANT

Utterances of 'Divine' Quoted Against Him; Declares Eye Was Not Tempted.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 22.—The Presbyterian general assembly went on record today as being opposed to the acceptance by the navy department of a silver service for the battleship Utah, which has engraved on the coffee tray an etching of Brigham Young and a view of the Mormon temple at Salt Lake in the background.

Every sense of honor, decency and morality and righteousness will be outraged by the acceptance of and honoring by the protection of the flag of the nation this memorial of shame.

The Rev. Francis Irwin of Louisville, Ky., made a speech in support of a resolution to raise a special fund so that every superannuated minister can receive \$500 a year and every widow at least \$500. He declared it would be infinitely kinder to take the old ministers and knock their heads together than to let them drag out an existence on a mere pittance, or send them to a home that was but a noisy and disgusting hospital.

HERESY TRIAL. That it was a physical impossibility for the man to have been in the pinnacle of the temple at Jerusalem and be tempted by Satan, as related in the New Testament, was one of the statements attributed to Rev. William D. Grant at the heresy trial before the permanent judicial committee.

Dr. Grant is charged with having said the opposite principle was entirely too small for anyone to stand on. In commenting on the death of Uzziah, who it was told in the Old Testament, was struck dead for daring to put his hand on the ark of the covenant, Dr. Grant is alleged to have said:

"This man Uzziah must have had an aneurism of the heart or have burst a blood vessel in his head. All Uzziah was trying to do was to prevent the sacred ark from slipping from the wagon or sledge upon which it was being carried. Evidently the weight of the ark was too much of a strain and the man dropped dead."

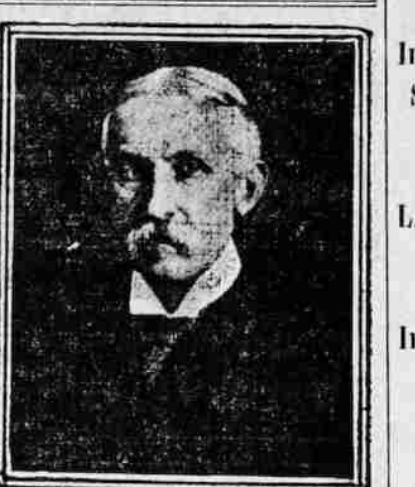

CREOSOTE COMES IN FREE OF DUTY

House Committee Investigating Charge That Uncle Sam Is Losing Millions in Revenue.

SECRETARY MACVEAGH ALLEGED TO HAVE SAID THEY COULD NOT AFFORD TO PAY DUTY.

WASHINGTON, May 22.—Testifying before the house committee on expenditures in the treasury department today, J. B. Stuart, formerly collector of customs at Newport News, said Secretary of the Treasury MacVeagh had told him the department reversed a ruling calling for the collection of a 20 per cent duty on creosote imports because the railroads could not afford to pay the duty.

Another witness testified that Secretary MacVeagh's brother had interested himself in the matter. Mr. Stuart, who caused an investigation of creosote imports at New Orleans, charged that the government was losing millions in revenues because creosote, dutiable at 20 per cent, was admitted as creosote oil, free of duty, was summoned before the committee as the result of testimony given previously in executive session by Allan R. Benson.

ASSISTANT WAS OVERRULED. Stuart related how he found that no duty was being collected from foreign ships whose manifests showed their cargoes were creosote. He was informed of the decision and the man who was in charge of the creosote matter, who explained the ruling.

ALLEGED REMARKS OF SECRETARY. Previously Allan R. Benson had told the committee, in executive session, that Stuart had told him of the remark Secretary MacVeagh had made to him. Benson also visited the secretary to inquire about the creosote ruling.

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LORIMER CASE IN THE SENATE

Immediate Investigation of Sweeping Scope Provided for in Two Resolutions.

LA FOLLETTE ASSAILS ILLINOIS SENATOR

Inquiry Will Probably Be Conducted by Privileges and Elections Committee.

WASHINGTON, May 22.—An immediate investigation of sweeping scope of the renewed charges that Senator Lorimer of Illinois is not entitled to his seat is provided for in two resolutions, called up by Senators Dillingham and La Follette in the senate today.

Both the Democratic steering committee and the Republican members of the committee on privileges and elections discussed the charges and Senator Dillingham, chairman of the elections committee, presented his resolution of inquiry as a substitute for the La Follette resolution.

SENATE TO AFFIRM CHOICE. It is likely the elections committee will be directed to investigate by a sub-committee to be chosen from its own members, but affirmed by the senate. Senator La Follette, who was apparently surprised by the Dillingham measure, counts on several progressives to support his resolution.

SENATOR LA FOLLETTE'S SPEECH WAS A PLEA FOR A REINVESTIGATION BECAUSE OF RECENT DEVELOPMENTS AND BECAUSE OF REVELATIONS DURING LAST SESSION. He delivered only half of his speech to day, dealing exclusively with the previous inquiry and will conclude tomorrow with a discussion of later developments.

CASE REVIEWED BY LA FOLLETTE. Mr. La Follette reviewed the Lorimer case, citing the confession of bribery in the interest of Mr. Lorimer's election. "Is there another senator against whom such an imputation could have been made who would not have risen in his seat and demanded an inquiry?" he asked.

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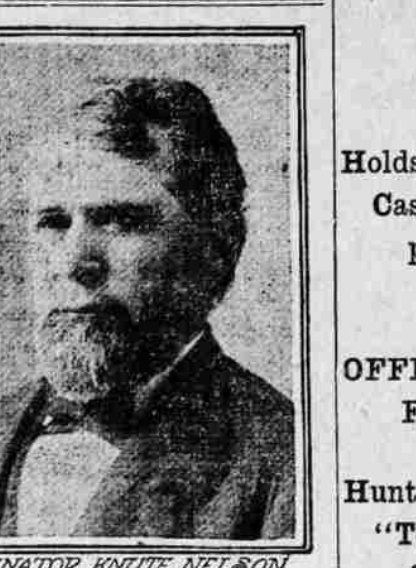
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Statesman Who Brands Taft Trifler



SENATOR NELSON ATTACKS PRESIDENT

Declares that Taft is Evading Constitution in the Matter of Reciprocity.

OFFERS SOME AMENDMENTS

John Norris, Representing the Publishers, Will Be Heard by Committee Today.

WASHINGTON, May 22.—Senator Nelson of Minnesota attacked President Taft today before the senate finance committee for seeking to prevent the senate from amending the Canadian reciprocity bill. He declared that the constitution made the committee authorized to exercise power of the country and offered several amendments to the measure.

SENATOR NELSON'S AMENDMENTS WOULD REDUCE ABOUT ONE-HALF THE EXISTING TARIFF RATES ON MOST FARM PRODUCTS. To put farm products on the free list, he declared, was legislating directly against the farmers.

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COURT ORDERS O'HARA AND CLORE FREED

Holds State Failed to Make Case Against Men Suspected of Overland Holdup.

OFFICERS EAGER TO FOLLOW NEW CLEW

Hunt for Men Implicated in "Tex" Hamilton's Confession Begun in Earnest.

VICTOR CLORE and Bryan O'Hara, the men charged with the robbery of the Overland Limited train at Reese on the night of January 2, and the murder of William N. Davis and Albert N. Taylor, negro porters, were freed at Ogden yesterday when Judge J. D. Murphy of the city court ordered their release. Judge Murphy held that the state had failed to make a case against the two men. Following the discharge of Clore and O'Hara, the officers have a tangible clew in the confession of "Tex" Hamilton or "Tex" O'Rackett, made through Pat Wycherly, an intermediary, in which confession "Big Dick" Wilson and Walter Foley, ex-convicts, were named as the bandits.

"Tex" said to be in hiding in this vicinity, promised, according to Wycherly, that rather than see Clore and O'Hara bound over, he would make a full breast of the whole thing and put the officers on the trail of the really guilty men. It is known, too, that a "Tex" bandit hoping to escape punishment for turning state's evidence, calculated that he would come in for a share of the \$500 reward offered by the Oregon Short Line Railroad company for the capture of the train robbers and murderers. Fearing to expose himself to a conference with the officers of Ogden and Salt Lake through Wycherly and Wycherly and Gilbert Belmont, former sheriff of Weber county, are also to receive a share of the reward money.

WYCHERLY AVOIDS VISITORS. "Tex" has not been seen personally by the officers, who know him, however, through his police record, and now Wycherly, following a conference with Chief of Police S. M. Barlow yesterday morning, is also keeping himself secret. Local police officials admit they do not know Wycherly, but that they know nothing of his connection with "Tex" or of the confession. It is known, however, through the police do not admit this, that Wycherly has been doing secret work for the police department for some time and that he has occasionally given them valuable information.

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
