Information for Pensioners. For the information of pensioners, we give below the substance of a circular letter sent out by the Auditor of Public Accounts to Clerks of Courts, dated April 15, 1902.

Pensioners under the Act of 1888, and Special Acts, should be paid before May 1st. On that day I will begin to pay them and from that work as rapidly as possible. The Board of Commissioners to be appointed by Judges of Circuit Courts of Counties, will inspect the original applications of pensioners under the Act of 1888, which are now on file in my office, and which he sent to the Clerks of said Courts, and will make inquiries regarding said applications, and those persons whose applications are approved by the Board, will be paid on and after Sept. 1st.

Those who shall make application for aid under the Act of April 24, 1902, and whose applications shall be allowed by the Board of Commissioners, will receive aid on 1st of September.

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Obituary

Mrs. Martha McCoy, nee Eagle, daughter of Col. Harman and Letitia Blair was born at Hines Mills, Pendleton county, W. Va., Jan. 10th, 1819, and died at the home of her son in law, J. H. Jones April 24th, 1902, aged 83 years and 2 months and 14 days. In June, 1841 she married the late Samuel F. Eagle who departed this life 18 years ago. To them were born eight children, four of whom survive, Mrs. B. Y. Rockwell of Augusta county, Mrs. E. L. Berlin of Rockingham Co. and Mrs. A. H. Jones and Samuel C. Eagle son of Highland Co. Va. While the late Mrs. H. H. Jones, Harman B. Eagle, Sallie Oliver, Martha D. (The two latter dying in childhood), preceded her to the glory land.

Mrs. Eagle leaves 16 grand-children and four great-grand-children. She was a faithful wife, a gentle and loving mother including in her children the principles of truth, honesty and christian living. She was a member of the first Sunday School ever organized in Pendleton county, now Highland, and was still connected with the Sunday School at the time of her death.

She was also a member of the Woman's Foreign Mission Society from its first organization to the close of her life. She joined the Methodist church in early life and was a faithful and consistent member for more than sixty years and died in the fullness of the christian faith. Mr. Eagle was gentle in manner, always considerate of the rights and feelings of others, hence she leaves no enemies but parts from many loving friends. On April the 7th, her remains were taken to her home at Doe Hill, where she has not occupied for some time but which still remains cherished. Here in the old home which aged people love as well as the body rested for a few hours and was laid to rest by the children and friends. And after the funeral services conducted by her pastor, Rev. M. P. White, she was borne from the church and laid to rest beside her husband there to await the resurrection of the just, while the spirit lives and rejoices in the Paradise of bliss.
