

SLAYS HIS FRIEND

Princess Anne Man Kills Companion and Attempts Suicide.

MANY CRIMES ARE COMMITTED

Front Royal Merchant Cuts His Throat Because Intended Wife Marries Another—Richmond Police Look for Editor's Murderer.

(Special to the Daily Press.) NORFOLK, VA., Oct. 16.—Princess Anne county, Va., noted for its remarkable and tragic occurrences, has added another to the chain.

William H. Davis, about 30 years of age, lies dead at his home from bullet wounds inflicted by John J. Dawley, aged 22 years, and Dawley is now in a desperate condition from burns received as the result of his having hid himself in his father's barn following the fatal shooting, and set fire to the barn.

The shooting of Davis occurred Saturday night. Dawley, it is charged, had been drinking and acting in a disorderly manner about a store kept by himself and father in Pungo district of Princess Anne county. The elder Dawley, to get his son home, asked Davis to take him in the latter's car. Davis consented to the pistol being given to him. The two men started for the Dawley home, but before they had gotten very far young Dawley drew his pistol and began firing into Davis. Then he jumped from the buggy and fled.

The next heard of him was when his father's barn was discovered to be on fire.

Rejected Suitor Commits Suicide. FRONT ROYAL, VA., Oct. 16.—The body of Samuel R. Richardson was found on the floor of his meat market yesterday morning, his throat being cut from ear to ear. He had worried a great deal of late because the woman he loved had married another man.

Editor's Murder a Negro. RICHMOND, Oct. 16.—Both the Richmond and Manchester police have been informed that the murderer of Jacob H. Thompson, the editor of the New York Times, who was murdered and robbed in the St. James hotel in New York on the night of Sept. 8, is a Manchester man and the police of both cities have been asked to keep a sharp lookout for him. He is a negro. An arrest was made tonight in this city of a negro answering fairly well to the description of the supposed murderer of Editor Thompson. He gives the name of Moses Morton.

Killed Himself Instead of Hawk. RICHMOND, Oct. 16.—James M. Craner accidentally shot himself yesterday morning and died almost instantly in his home, "Cedar Lawn," in Henrico county. Mr. Craner was attempting to shoot a hawk when he stepped into a hole and fell. Mr. Craner came from Indianapolis several weeks ago. He was a native of North Carolina. He leaves a wife and two children.

College Man on Trial for Murder. PETERSBURG, Oct. 16.—John W. Richards, 21 years old, was placed on trial in the Floyd county court today on the charge of murdering Maurice K. Francis.

Francis was shot from ambush. The killing occurred two months ago while Francis was on his way to see Miss Grace Clark, his fiancée, to whom he was to have been married this month. It is also alleged that Richards was a rival suitor and killed the girl's lover.

The prisoner is a first-year law student of the University of Virginia and had been teaching school in Floyd county.

Firebugs at Dinwiddie. PETERSBURG, VA., Oct. 16.—A. E. Alwood, owner of the Burgess farm at Burgess, Dinwiddie, lost a number of outbuildings last night at the hands of incendiaries. Four buildings were burned with their contents of grain.

"Hurricane" Branch with his bloodhounds went out to the farm this morning to endeavor to run down the incendiaries.

Italian Have a Murderous Fight. CHICAGO, Oct. 16.—After he had been stabbed by Joseph Toscano while engaged in a fight last night, Vito Foglia, 50 years old, drew a revolver and fired at Toscano. As he fell in the street Foglia's two sons, Pietro, 20 years old, and Anthony, 14 years old, went to the aid of their father and fired several shots at the body. Toscano was dead when the police arrived.

COL. ARMSTRONG HAS PASSED AWAY

End Came to This Well Known Gentleman in a Washington Hospital Yesterday Morning.

Colonel William Armstrong, whose serious illness was announced in these columns last Friday, died in a Washington hospital at 1 o'clock yesterday morning. No arrangements have been made for the funeral, although it is expected that the burial will be made in Washington.

Colonel Armstrong was widely known as a lawyer, writer and polished gentleman. He had traveled extensively and was a most delightful companion.

Colonel Armstrong was attorney general of the Sandwich Islands under the reign of King Kalakoa during the administration of President Grant.

After Mr. Armstrong's service under King Kalakoa he published a newspaper in the islands for a few years and then returned to the United States, buying an estate on Hampton Road, across the creek from the S. J. Gibbs' Home. He lived there during the time not spent in travel.

Colonel Armstrong was a brother of the late General Armstrong founder of the Hampton Normal school, and father of Messrs. M. C. Armstrong, Richard Armstrong, Miss Dorothy Armstrong, of Hampton, and Mr. Karlarmy Armstrong, of Chicago.

News of his death, while expected here, caused much sorrow among his circle of friends.

Chaplain Jones, of the United States receiving ship Franklin, at Portsmouth navy yard, delivered the charge to the knights.

At the coronation ball last night, which was held in the pavilion, Mr. Harry R. Houston made the coronation address.

MEDALS FOR HEROES

Carnegie Fund to go to Ten Brave Persons.

MONEY AWARDED TO RESCUERS

Woman Who Lost Her Life in Trying to Save a Negro Is Recognized as Deserving and Her Children Are to Get \$1,000.

(By Associated Press.)

PITTSBURG, PA., Oct. 16.—The Carnegie hero fund made public this afternoon the result of its investigation of a large number of cases which were supposed to entitle the participants to recognition under the hero fund provision provided by Andrew Carnegie several years ago.

Ten awards were made for heroes in widely separated parts of this country and Canada, among them the following: Wade H. Plummer, aged 15, on May 7, 1904, on Lynch's river near Lamar, S. C., saved a companion, John M. Gibson, aged 19, from drowning, after a desperate struggle. The commission awarded him a silver medal and \$500 to be devoted to educational purposes.

Mrs. Sadie L. Crabbe, aged 35, of Cooper's Landing, Va., lost her life in February 11, 1905, while attempting to save from drowning Ralph Young, (colored) aged 19, a laborer. Mrs. Crabbe is survived by her husband, Charles, a son, aged 9, and three small daughters. The family is very poor. The commission awarded a bronze medal and appropriated \$1,000 to be expended by the executive committee as it thinks best for the children.

Miss Anna Margaret Cunningham, aged 20, a nurse at the Savannah hospital, Savannah, Ga., was awarded a bronze medal for her part in the attempt to save from drowning on May 26, 1905, Walker Curtis, aged 21, an attorney of Savannah.

SHOOTS THE CHIEF AND ANOTHER MAN

Anniston Citizen While Drunk Kills One Person and Wounds Policeman.

ANNISTON, ALA., Oct. 16.—J. W. Trigg is dead and Chief of Police Dill wounded as a result of a shooting affair here tonight.

L. E. Pippin, overseer of the city streets, died the shooting. All the men were friends. Pippin had been drinking during the day and tonight he passed the city hall, on the steps of which Mr. Trigg and Chief Dill were talking. Pippin, after spacking to both men, drew two pistols and opened fire. Mr. Trigg fell, mortally wounded, and Chief Dill received two painful flesh wounds, after which he overpowered Pippin and arrested him. The shooting was without provocation.

AUDIENCE HISSES DIXON AND PLAY

"Clansman," Presented in South Carolina Arouses Hostility of the Playgoers.

COLUMBIA, S. C., Oct. 16.—Thomas Dixon's "Clansman" was presented here Saturday night to one of the largest audiences of recent years. This may be partially explained by the fact that the scene of the play is laid at Piedmont, this State.

Throughout the performance there were hisses from all parts of the theatre, but these were increased when Dixon appeared before the curtain after the third act.

Rev. Richard Carroll, a negro educator of this State, who saw the play by invitation, afterward stated to the author that he was making "blood money" from the negro. He said the play would do great harm in inciting strife between the races.
