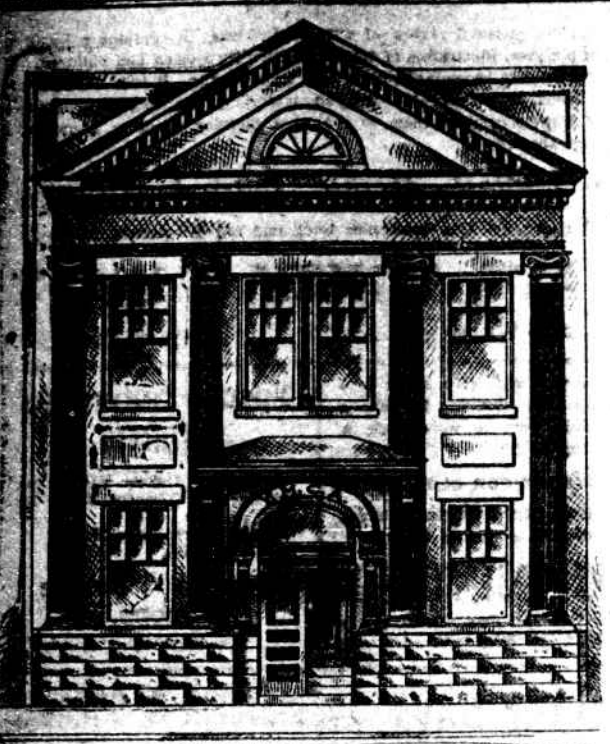


# HAMPTON, PHOEBUS AND OLD POINT.

Hampton High School Defeated Newport News High School at Baseball.

## VISITORS WERE CLEARLY OUTPLAYED

Old Point Comfort College Defeated Fox Hill on the Lattar's Diamond by Score of 11 to 2—Athletics to Meet Fort Y. M. C. A.

The baseball team of the Newport News High school fell a victim to the strong line of the Hampton High school on New Park diamond yesterday afternoon to the tune of 11 to 3. It was a complete victory for the Hamptons, who clearly outplayed the Shipbuilders at every point in the contest. "Beanie" Burbanks was the man in the box and he was given superb support by every player on the local team. Powell distinguished himself in the field, and Brittingham, as usual, was in good trim behind the bat. The team work of the High school line was most creditable. A large crowd from Hampton and Newport News witnessed the battle.

Old Point Comfort College. The nine of the Old Point Comfort College, accompanied by a large contingent of rosters, went out to Fox Hill on hay wagons yesterday afternoon and defeated the team of that place by the score of 11 to 2. The collegians showed up in excellent form and although the score appears one sided the contest was interesting. A crowd of 200 witnessed the game. The collegians were elated over the sportmanlike treatment they received from the Fox Hill team, as well as the reception accorded them by the people of that town.

Cleveland Harrison, a son of Colonel G. F. E. Harrison, of Fort Monroe, was used in the box for five innings by the collegians and his good head work was commended upon by the crowd. Harrison is a coming twirler. McCann, in his usual good form, pitched four innings.

The college played Brown in right and he distinguished himself by pulling down several long drives that looked good for top and three baggers.

Fox Hill got one man around the diamond in the first inning and the second one in the seventh. With a little more practice Fox Hill will be a most formidable aggregation. Johnson was in the box yesterday.

Game Today. At New Park diamond this afternoon the Athletics of North End noon the Newport News Athletics will play the Fort Monroe Y. M. C. A. in the series of the Peninsula League games. The game will be called at 2:30 o'clock.

## DR. FRANK W. SHIELD TO RUN FOR TREASURER

Announced His Candidacy Yesterday for the City Election in June of Next Year.

Although the city election for mayor, treasurer, sergeant and sixteen members of the council does not occur until June of next year considerable interest was created in political circles yesterday by the announcement of Dr. Frank W. Shield that he will be a candidate for city treasurer. Dr. Shield is at present the assistant in the office of City Treasurer David Johnson and has long been identified with politics, having for many years served the county as the chairman of the Democratic party. He has started quietly on his campaign and will be in the fight to win.

City Treasurer Alonza A. Patrick, who is filling out his third term, will again be an aspirant and he will support his claim for re-election by the excellent record he has had since becoming treasurer.

There are quite a number of candidates named for mayor, but so far no one has announced himself. Among the names associated with the nomination are Mayor Thornton F. Jones, Councilman C. Vernon Spratley and Councilman W. W. Richardson. It is also rumored that Mr. R. L. Galar will likely aspire for the office again.

This will be the first election of a sergeant by the people in Hampton, as under the town government the sergeant was chosen by the council.

## CONTRACT AWARDED

Estimates For the Construction of the Young Men's Christian Association Home Too High

## ELIMINATE SEVERAL FEATURES

Being This the Building Committee to Have Work Started in Near Future—Will Formally Award Contract Next Tuesday Afternoon—Four Bids Submitted.

After listening to the reading of bids, which were opened in the assembly office of the Young Men's Christian Association yesterday afternoon, the building committee adjourned next Tuesday afternoon at 6 o'clock when the contract will be awarded to one of the firms submitting bids.

The bids were above the appropriations and it may be necessary for the committee to eliminate one or two of the features in the building plans. It is accomplished it cannot be accurately who is the lowest bidder. Mr. C. T. Holt is the lowest for the work as shown in the plans and specifications are the four bidders and their estimates.

## NEGROES WILL LIKELY NOMINATE MATT N. LEWIS

Negro Editor in Newport News Will Probably be Named for Congress in the First District.

When the negro Republican voters of the First Congressional district meet in Newport News next Wednesday it is understood that Matt N. Lewis, the negro editor of Newport News, will be probably nominated as the candidate of his race for Congress.

The convention of the negro voters has been called to select delegates to the Richmond state convention to protest against the recent action of the Virginia Republican convention in Roanoke in making the party a "lily white" one. The negro voters in Elizabeth City county have been active and it is said among the best known men in the race here that the negroes are determined to resent the action of the white leaders in the party. In fact it is stated as a foregone conclusion that the nomination of Matt N. Lewis will be made and that a strong delegation will be sent to the Richmond convention.

"I believe," said a prominent negro leader, to The Daily Press representative, "that voters of my race will support Mr. Bryan in the coming presidential election, as they recognize that the Republicans have used us merely for political capital."

The Newport News convention will be attended by representatives of the negro race from every county in the First district.
