Hon. Claude A. Swanson, Democratic nominee for Governor of Virginia, opened his campaign at Hanover courthouse on Monday in a speech too forcible and convincing to leave anyone in doubt, who has read it, as to the wisdom of his party in selecting him as its standard bearer. No one can read it and arrive at any other conclusion in the light of the facts and figures presented by him, or fail to be proud of the record which the Democratic party has made in the State. The speech, briefly summed up, was a contrast in the records of the two parties, in which it was shown by Mr. Swanson that the Republican party in Virginia to-day is the same old Republican party of misrule, confusion and disaster, as it had been in the past, as was proven by him, in the record which it had made of late years in Kentucky, Maryland, and other Southern States, while the Democratic administration during the same period had been remarkably clean and progressive; so clean, in fact, as was stated by him, that in the handling of sixty millions of dollars by its officials there had been only one defaulter in the number, in a sum less than forty thousand dollars, and the guilty man was in the penitentiary; and so progressive had it been, for instance, that while "the total expenditure for public schools in 1885, the last year of Republican rule in this State, was \$1,423,531.06, the total expenditure for the purpose, under Democratic rule, was \$2,511,093.20, nearly double the amount appropriated for this purpose by the Republicans, that while the average term of public schools in Virginia in 1885 was about five months in the year it is now about seven months in the year.

Mr. Swanson also contrasted the record of the two parties in the State on the debt question and showed that, without leaving any stain on the honor of the State, it had been settled by the Democratic party at a saving of nine million dollars less than under the plan proposed by the Republicans. Mr. Swanson also showed since Democracy had come again into power how the credit of the State had been elevated and the progress which had been made in taking care of the disabled Confederate soldiers and the insane, in agriculture and our many other industries—in everything in fact, which pertains to the welfare and happiness of its people, and closed with an earnest appeal to the voters to continue in power the Democratic party with its splendid record and the great and good reforms it had brought to the State. He made no appeal in his speech to prejudice and did not need to do so. The Democrats of the State have an impregnable record and with it he has the right to expect a glorious victory in November. There can be no question as to the result, but as to the majority Mr. Swanson will receive. Senator Martin is reported as putting it down at about forty thousand, and it ought not to fall short of that figure, perhaps, if the Democrats poll their strength in November.

The campaign expenses of the candidates in the Democratic primary have been reported and show that Senator Martin in the race expended \$11,542.02, and Governor Montague less than one-half of that amount, \$5,364.91; that the cost to Mr. Swanson, candidate for Governor, was \$9,840.46, and of his competitor, Judge Mann, \$5,346.25; that Mr. Elyson who was practically without opposition in the race for Lieutenant-Governor spent \$2,600, and Mr. Cabell his opponent, about \$500. The cost to Mr. Eggleston, nominee for Superintendent of Public Instruction, was \$807.82. Mr. Hulvey, his opponent, and Mr. Willard, according to latest advices, had not reported.

Former Governor O'Ferrall is unconscious. Paralysis of the throat has set in and death cannot be long delayed. It is learned that while his condition is considered hopeless he is likely to live several days.

Governor Montague will make his first speech of the campaign at Middlesex Courthouse Tuesday. Thereafter he will speak regularly in different parts of the State until election day.
