ALLEGED SWINDLERS.

A scheme that is alleged to be an improvement on the sick engineer game, but dealt in whisky, instead of mining stock, and is said to have defrauded a least 50 liquor dealers in all parts of the country out of thousands of dollars, was uncovered in New York yesterday when government officials raided the Valley Dew Distilling Company at 1 Union Square.

Motiz Hirsch, the president; Leopold Weiss, secretary, and Jules Kramer, manager of the local office, were locked up charged with operating a scheme to defraud through the mails and grand larceny. The grand larceny charge was made by the Kohn Liquor Company, of Ogden, Utah, which claims to have spent \$1,500 for Valley Dew whisky and get nothing.

The concern claims to have not been able to find any distillery bearing that name.

It is alleged that in some cases the wholesaler would put up a certain amount of cash, and in others give notes for the whisky. In return he got supposed warehouse receipts for the money, or notes, whereby it appeared that all the dealer had to do was to present the receipts at the warehouse and get the whisky.

It is claimed that Hirsch and Weiss had been working this scheme since 1906 and made \$100,000 a year out of it, chiefly because they dealt with liquor dealers in distant cities, who did not want the expense of visiting New York to prosecute them.

IMPRISONED EIGHTEEN DAYS.

Two girls, one aged twenty and the other nineteen, and their brother, aged thirteen, were rescued yesterday from a pile of ruins near the Church of the Apostles, Missions, where they had been entombed for eighteen days. Their condition is pitiable. Some soldiers near the place heard faint cries from beneath the pile of debris and they immediately began to excavate. Their work was extremely difficult, but they persisted and were finally rewarded by finding the three still alive.

The three are named Minisul. Their mother and a little sister were killed. The father is in America. Fortunately they were within reach of a supply of onions, oil, wine and water sufficient to keep them alive.

The survivors were in part of a small room, which astonishingly escaped pulverization. Their own efforts led to their rescue. The boy, Francesco, was particularly active. They excavated the ruins with their hands until they were near enough the surface to make their cries heard.

NEW SIGNAL TESTED.

The officials of the city of Rochester, N. Y., and representatives of its railway company a day or two ago attended the test of the Pe-tey signal which has been placed at Platt street to warn trolley car motormen that a fire alarm has been sounded and that the fire companies are likely to pass across State street at that point. The test was satisfactory and the machine will be kept at Platt street indefinitely, until the officials of the railway company officially adopt the signal and order more to be placed at other dangerous crossings.

Among those who saw the signal put through the test were General Manager E. J. Cook, general superintendent of transportation, W. E. W. Griffin, superintendent of transportation, William C. Calaghas, superintendent of the eastern division, B. C. Ameybury, superintendent of the western division, Fred A. Livershah, all of the Rochester Railway Company, fire chief Little and commissioner of public safety Charles S. Owen.

COOK USED GUN.

Because he complained that the biscuits were heavy, Emily Meynard, a pretty French servant girl, opened fire on her employer, Frank Ducas, while he sat at breakfast in St. George, Staten Island, yesterday. She fired two shots. Neither struck Ducas, who promptly ducked under the table, but one of them pierced a biscuit and one went through the strap pitcher. Ducas, who hired the girl a few months ago, boasted to all his friends that he had the best cook on St. George. But yesterday he scolded her, and the rights of the long-suffering servant girl came nearly being violated at her hands. "I am sorry I did not kill him," said the girl. "He insulted me." In the New Brighton Police Court Emily was so violent that Magistrate Hanny sent her to the county workhouse.

BIG IMPORTS OF POTATOES.

Thousands of bushels of German, Irish, Scotch and English potatoes are being landed in consequence of a short crop in the United States, particularly in Pennsylvania. Four steamers engaged in the transatlantic trade, the Menominee, from Antwerp; the Mackinaw, from Liverpool; the Lobelia, from Leith, and the Vitalis, are due there this week with 100,000 sacks consigned to Philadelphia produce dealers.

The Allan liner Nauidian, from Glasgow yesterday, finished discharging at Willow street wharf 30,000 bushels of Scotch potatoes, which had been sold some time prior to her arrival in port. Each sack contains 155 pounds, and the cargo is 25 cents per bushel of 60 pounds. The freight amounts to about 20 cents a sack from Hamburg, less than it would cost to bring the potatoes from New York to Philadelphia.

TOO KINGLY.

Senator Koop's bill to create the office of "Under Secretary of State" at a salary of \$10,000 a year, which of his colleagues of the senate secretary of state were kindly rushing through for him, struck a snag yesterday, and now there is no telling whether it will get through, the words "Under Secretary of State" will probably be changed to something else.

Senator Clay, of Georgia, objected to the appropriation when the government salary supply bill was up. He didn't like the sound of the words, "Under Secretary of State." That is the kind of name that is given officials in the British, German and other monarchical governments, and it savored too much of royalty and that sort of thing to suit a democrat. The provision went over upon his objection.
