INTERSTATE RAILROAD CO.

Vs. Norfolk & Western Railway Co. and Louisville & Nashville Railroad Company.

(Special Correspondent.)

Richmond, Va., Dec. 6. —The evidence in the above case, pending before the State Corporation Commission was finished today, and thereupon the question arose as to time to be allowed for oral argument and, also, as to whether counsel desired to file briefs, and after some discussion it was finally agreed to submit the case to the commission without either argument or briefs, and the commission retired, and after about twenty minutes returned, and Judge Prentiss, chairman of the commission, delivered an oral opinion deciding all the points in the case for the Interstate Railroad company, holding in brief that an essential public convenience required that the Interstate should build its depot on the south side of Park avenue, near the depot of the Norfolk & Western, and should likewise extend its railroad through the town to a con-

nection with the Wise Terminal, and that the property which it is seeking to take from the Norfolk & Western Railway Company for these purposes was not essential to the purposes of the Norfolk & Western Railway Company or the Louisville & Nashville Railroad Company.

Counsel for the defendants asked that the execution of the order be suspended for sixty days, in order that they might have time to appeal to the Supreme Court of Appeals, and this was done. If the case is taken to the Court of Appeals it will not be finally decided until next June or later. This will, of course, necessarily delay the work of building the depot, etc., as nothing can be done until after a final decision.

DEAD IN A PIT.

Edward Glenn, Well Known Ball Player, Found Dead In Ludlow.

Edward Glenn, aged 37, well known baseball player, was found dead in a drop pit at the Queen & Crescent Railroad shops at 5:15 yesterday morning with his skull crushed. While the exact manner of his death is not known, it is supposed that while leaving the shop after working hours Wednesday night he fell into the pit, which is about 15 feet deep and constructed of concrete. His body was found early yesterday by workmen.

Glenn was a well known ball player, having played in the Eastern, Southern and Virginia Leagues, and was at one time a member of the Chicago Nationals. While playing with the Memphis team at Jackson, Tenn., he accidentally fell from a window in a hotel and broke his collar bone, after which he never again played with the big leagues. For the past few years he had played with different teams in the Blue Grass League.

He was single and lived with his parents on Ash street, Ludlow, Ky. The body was taken to Allison & Yate's undertaking establishment in Covington, where it was prepared to be taken home. The funeral will take place Saturday morning at 9 o'clock from St. James Church, Ludlow. Rev. Father Thomas Kehoe officiating—Cincinnati Enquirer.

Mr. Glenn was well known in the Gap, being a member of the Big Stone Gap baseball team during the summer of 1907.
