Uncle Sam's Crack Cavalry Regiment.

Colonel James Parker, Commanding the 11th U. S. Cavalry, is one of the most distinguished officers of the service. Joining the 4th Cavalry in Texas in 1876, he took part in the operations under General Mackenzie against the Kickapoos in Mexico, and served against the Apaches in Arizona and Senora. Became Captain in the 4th Cavalry in 1888, made Lieut-Colonel 12th N. Y. Infantry in 1898. During 1899 served with the 4th Cavalry in the Philippines, and in August of that year became Lieut-Colonel of the 45th U. S. Infantry. At Vigan, Ilocos, Norte, he withstood an attack of 1500 Filipinos under Gen. Tino, with a force of 150 men, largely of the 33rd Infantry, a regiment raised in Texas six months before. For gallantry in this action was granted the Medal of Honor, the highest military decoration. In 1900 he took part in the Cavite, Batangas and Camarines campaigns, becoming Lieut-Colonel of the 13th Cavalry, after the close of the Philippine war. In 1907 he became colonel of the 11th Cavalry, joining the regiment at Pinar del Rio, Cuba, and has since commanded that organization.—Texas Field and National Guardsman.

Captain M. W. Rawell, 11th Cavalry, commanding Troop D, will be in command of the Cavalry maneuvers.

Understood That Bristolian Will at Once Become Collector.

It is expected that President Taft will send the nomination of D. F. Bailey, as internal revenue collector for the Sixth collection district, to the Senate this week. Immediately after the nomination is made the Bristolian will take charge of the office at Abingdon, relieving Hon. L. P. Summers, who has resigned to go to the Chicago convention unhampered by being a federal officeholder.

There is considerable speculation as to what Mr. Summers has been promised. It is understood on what appears to be good authority that he has been promised something in the way of a very pronounced promotion. Whether it will be a federal judgeship, an important position in the department of justice or a position in the diplomatic service as minister to some foreign country remains to be seen. Friends of Mr. Summers are inclined to think that he will be given something in the legal line as he is very much devoted to his profession and would not be surprised to see him made a federal judge, if a vacancy occurs.

Mr. Summers will not have a position until after the present political disturbances subside. He will take an active interest in the race of Congressman Stemp for reelection in the Ninth district; after the Chicago convention a convention will be called to nominate Mr. Stemp. He will have no opposition for the nomination.

Congress

Prepares for the Hot Summer Days.

Washington, June 8.—Congress has apparently settled down to the conviction that no adjournment can take place earlier than August first. Plans for cooling the chambers of the Senate and the House are therefore being made, in order to protect as much as possible from the rigors of the heated period the statesmen who must remain in Washington at a time when ordinarily they would be seeking cool mountain resorts and the national playgrounds by the sea. Great exhaust fans are being installed which will exhaust the heated air from the chambers, it is said, every seven minutes, replacing it by air from the outside that has been conducted through vaults stored with tons of ice. The plan is supposed to furnish fresh cool air to the laboring representatives and senators of the people. Such measures are necessary, for the reason that both the House and Senate chambers are entirely shut off by outside rooms from any immediate access to the out door air. Surmounted as they are by glass skylights on which the sun beats with all its power, these rooms would be unbearable if some such means were not resorted to to make them more comfortable.
