Treating Twenty Persons Bit By Suspected Animals.

Richmond, Va., July 18.—At the laboratory of the State Board of Health, seventeen persons who have been bitten by animals suspected of hydrophobia are now under treatment. This record equals that made by the Department at any time and indicates, according to Health officers, that the number of rabid animals in the State is not being reduced. Reports are constantly being received of animals which have shown symptoms of rabies and repeated warnings promptly to tie up all animals that show any signs of sickness have met with little public support. Unless precautions are taken, there is danger of a widespread prevalence of rabies.

Clinchfield To Increase Output.

Bristol, Va., July 20.—As an evidence of the Clinchfield Coal Corporation, operating mines at Dante, Va., to increase its output, the corporation is now having recorded here an amendment to its charter by which its capital stock is increased from \$15,000,000 to 18,000,000. The increase was made necessary by the project to extend the Carolina, Clinchfield & Ohio railway through the mountains from Dante, Va., to Elkhorn City, Ky., as a result of which the corporation will have a direct outlet for northern and western cities. New equipment will be purchased and new mines be opened.

Vital Statistics Rules

Issued in New Edition.

Richmond, Va., July 20.—Rules and regulations for the guidance of those administering the vital statistics law have been issued in a new edition by the State Board of Health. The new pamphlet, the first copies of which were delivered today, contains the text of the vital statistics law, regulations for physicians, undertakers, registrars and midwives and facsimile reproductions of model birth and death certificates. The new regulations will be sent to registrars, undertakers and physicians without delay and will be distributed to other interested persons upon request.

Dispensaries of Hookworm

Many Cases of Hookworm Treated by State's Agents.

Richmond, Va., July 18.—Field agents of the State Health Department, working in cooperation with the Rockefeller Sanitary Commission, are meeting with marked success in their treatment of cases in Bedford and adjacent counties. While the infection with the "American murder" does not seem to be as extensive in the Blue Ridge Counties as in some parts of Tidewater, many cases of the disease have been diagnosed and treated. The Department announced today the opening of new dispensaries in Franklin and Henry Counties during the next month, under the direction of Drs. W. A. Brunfield and K. E. Miller. A dispensary has also been established in Essex County under the supervision of Dr. A. C. Fisher. This will remain open for the treatment of cases in various parts of the county until the middle of August.

Freeling, Va., 18.—The first case for violations of the election laws of Dickenson county was tried in Judge Skeen's court on Saturday, the result of which was acquittal of the defendant.

Daugherty, from Grundy, represented the defense.
