Fatal Accident at Norton.

News was received here Monday afternoon by R. R. Casper, auditor of the Stonega Coke and Coal Company, announcing an accident on the Norfolk & Western yards at Norton, which resulted in fatal injuries to his father, J. B. Casper, for many years car inspector for that railroad, at Norton. From our information it seems Mr. Casper was repairing something about the bumpers of a freight car when the yard engine, which was making up a train, backed in on his switch and pinioned him between the two cars. One hand was caught in the bumpers and mashed off, though death which followed in only a few minutes, was probably due to internal injuries.

Mr. Casper was about 55 years old, and is survived by his wife and son, Ray, of this place. He was held in high esteem by a host of friends whom the Post joins in offering condolence.

Burial took place yesterday at 4 o'clock in the cemetery at Norton.
