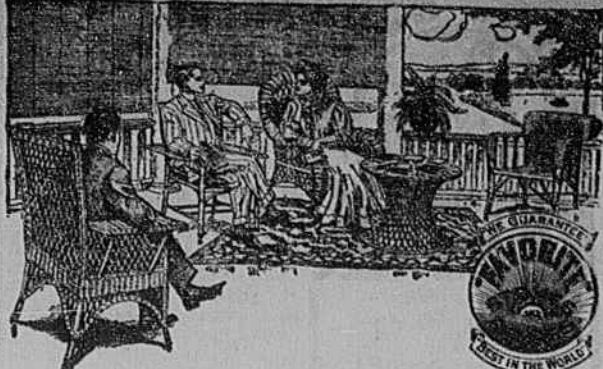
Miss Christie Jones, of East Stone Gap, was in town Sunday enroute to Coeburn, where she teaches school.

Drowned in Reservoir

Theodore Watts, a small boy about nine years old, was drowned in the Tannery reservoir on the side of the mountain near Cadet about 3:30 Sunday afternoon. It is not known exactly how the accident happened, but it is thought he was walking around the edge and became overbalanced and fell in, the water being about ten feet deep. Two other boys, who were with young Watts, ran and notified Mr. Layfield, who lives about a hundred yards below the reservoir. He went and found the boy lying on the bottom and quickly got him out. A physician was summoned and everything possible was done to save the lad, but life had been extinct for some time. The deceased was the son of Joe Watts, who works at the Tannery. Burial took place in Scott county Tuesday afternoon.
