All public school children ten years old and over are requested to meet at the school building at 4 o'clock this afternoon to prepare to take part in the Fourth of July parade.


Misses Edna McConnell and Mary McCarty, of Coeburn, are with Mrs. J. W. Hisel while attending the Normal.


