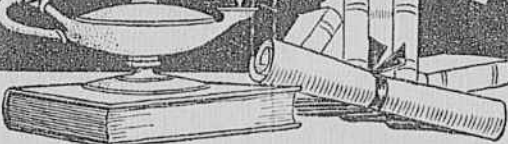
We are glad to report that Dr. J. W. Kelly, who has been very ill at his home on Poplar Hill for some time, is able to be out again.
