**FEDERAL FOOD ADMINISTRATION FOR VIRGINIA.**  
Information—News—Stullings.

"We have the problem of maintaining the men in that line and back of that line. We must not run any risk. There must be no narrow margins. We must build up reserves against the lean years. We must see that there is plenty over there so that no matter what happens to the shipping in any month they are safe."—Herbert Hoover.

The housewife is relied on to use only "Victory Bread," and in home baking to mix at least 20 per cent of the substitute cereals into the wheat flour. She is expected to continue to serve corn bread and other wheat saving quick breads frequently. Corn meal for the use of corn bread should be purchased separately from combination sales.

"Not all of us can go to the front. Only a few, relatively, can feel the thrill of patriotic pride that comes from direct service in the war machine. But every one of us can save food. To cooperate with the Food Administration is to perform the universal service in which every American, without exception, can help directly to win the war."—Senator Calder of New York.

America is not rationed. Her people have been asked, however, to keep with in two pounds of sugar per person per month for table and cooking use.

England is on a sugar ration. The wife of the British Food Controller remarked recently that she and her husband and the housekeeper were saving the whole of their sugar ration for jam making. They go without it in their coffee and use substitutes in cooking. In this way sugar enough has been saved to eat a gross and a half of tins of fruit. This is used for the invalided soldiers whom they have in their homes.

**Marketing the 1918 Wheat Crop.**

The movement of wheat to primary markets between July 1st and August 28, 1918, was 105,500,000 bushels, more than four times what it was during the corresponding period in 1917, when only 25,750,000 bushels were moved. These enormous shipments have made it difficult for wheat growers to secure grain cars when desired, a condition aggravated by the movement of corn and oats, also greater than last year. In consequence, a large part of the 1918 wheat crop remains in the hands of the producers, and grain dealers and millers have in some cases sought to raise the price paid for wheat below the farmer's reasonable expectation.

It is now being collected by the Food Administration upon which it base conclusions as to what constitutes a fair price in the different localities.

Farmers who are able to get cars are protected because they can ship directly to the grain corporation at the nearest primary market. Where cars cannot be secured the producer's wheat is stored in his granary until he can get a fair price offered by local operators. They will not be considered unpatriotic if they hold their wheat until either they are offered a fair price or can secure a car in which to make shipment to the Grain Corporation.

"The Plan of Wheat and Flour Control," an eight-page pamphlet issued by the United States Food Administration, gives a clear statement of its best results for, and may be secured upon application to the Grain Corporation, 12 Broadway, New York.

**Retailer's Margins of Profit On Fresh Butter.**

The retail merchant dealing in fresh, as well as cold storage, butter is now being told the reasonable margin of profit per cent to him of the particular butter sold. Cost for the purposes of this rule includes: Purchase price, transportation charges, if any; actual cost of printing if the butter is put in print form from tubs or cubes. But cost does not include any allowances for shrinkage in weight, commissions or other expenses than those listed.

The Retail Section of the Distribution of Perishables of the United States Food Administration has investigated the cost of handling butter at retail, and determined that any advance in excess of five cents at "Cash and Carry" stores, and six at "Credit and Delivery" stores will be considered evidence of violation of the regulations of the Food Administration.

In estimating cost of cold storage butter, insurance and storage charges actually incurred and interest on money actually invested at the current rate while the butter is in storage may be included.

The Baking Division of the United States Food Administration has established the maximum retail price of bread at 10 cents for one-pound loaf, 15 cents for one and one-half pounds loaf.

These are maximum prices for either "Cash and Carry" or "Credit and Delivery," and should be strictly enforced. They are based upon investigation made by the Baking Division of manufacturing cost and wholesale and retail prices of bread.

The investigation further shows 8 cents and 12 cents wholesale price in many sections. Wherever these wholesale prices prevail, they warrant retail prices of 9 cents for one-pound loaf and 14 cents for one and one-half pounds loaf, "Cash and Carry."
