The music for the occasion will be furnished by Shannon's all star society six which is one of the best dance orchestras that can be had.

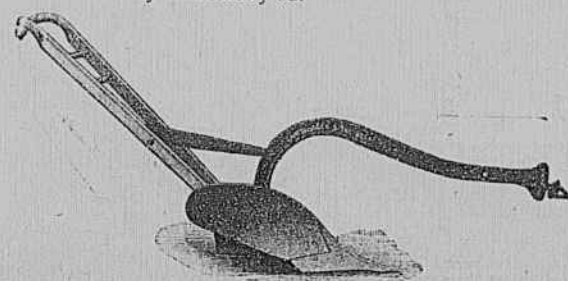
Meeting Continues.
