PURPOSED INCREASED FARE.

Alexandria is not the only city which is being caused by anxiety by the intended increase in electric railway rates. The following was printed in a Philadelphia paper today:

"Woodbury N. J., Sept. 12.—Mantua, Almonesso and Blackwood, towns touched by the trolley road, are going to lose some of their good citizens, it is claimed, because of the increase in fares which go into effect on Sunday. There are scores of men with families who moved to these rural sections while employed at the big industries above this city, because of the low fares. The rates have increased once, and now a new schedule of fares will cut a swath in the salaries. With the opening of Noreg and Yorkship, hundreds of homes are available, and many of these people are preparing to move there—at least for the winter."

Alexandria is facing similar conditions. Thousands of our people are employed in Washington, and they utilize the electric railway in making the trips between the two cities. In fact there is no other mode of transportation except by steam trains which do not leave this city or Washington at hours to suit commuters. Besides many who work in Washington would be compelled to traverse a mile twice a day in making trips from the union passenger station.

Alexandria is facing an ordeal. During the past two years our population has greatly increased, and we desire to keep the newcomers with us. Many of them reside in Alexandria and work in Washington. Doubling the fare between the two cities will surely decrease our population, as it is about to do in the New Jersey towns referred to.

People who reside in the southeastern section of the city, have been allowed to remain on the Mt. Vernon trains until they pass Franklin street, or within a square or two of their homes. This is appreciated, especially during inclement weather. This privilege, it is said, will be denied in future if passengers refuse to pay extra fare.

A SUDDEN CHANGE

A newspaper, man born and reared in this city, but who for a long time had been a resident of Baltimore, while on a visit to his old home several years ago called at this office. He had almost from the time he entered his majority been employed on papers of Baltimore. During his conversation he asked us if we had not noticed that a certain paper in the monumental city never printed the name of Alexandria in any connection whatever. We had not noticed this alleged omission, but from that time in glancing over the paper referred to we became convinced that our friend was correct. Although containing long columns of happenings in Virginia—many of a trivial nature—no dispatches from Alexandria appeared in the paper. Our attention was especially directed to this some time ago when a legal decision was delivered in this city. The decision was of general interest throughout the state and was published in most papers. The Baltimore paper published it, but the man who prepared the copy dated the dispatch "Fredericksburg."

After reading the dispatch our mind went back to ante bellum times, when the paper referred to was in its boyhood days and its publishers were endeavoring to raise a subscription list in Alexandria. It succeeded in securing some subscribers, and for a time the paper was distributed by carrier to numbers of Alexandrians.

This circulation, however, was not maintained and it finally became so contracted that the mail was used to supply the few subscribers in our city. This is being done today. About twenty years ago an attempt was made to secure a large circulation in this city, but it proved a failure.
