WORK OF COMMON COUNCIL

Quite an Important Session Held Last Night.

NO MONEY FOR ATLANTIC CITY

The Council Last Night Disposed of About One-Half of New Business.

Will Meet Again Next Thursday Night. Single Pavement Not Approved.

The regular monthly meeting of the Common Council was held last night with President Roper in the chair and the following members present: Sheldon, Moore, Philpotts, Walker, Collins, Wright, Shelton, Lewis, Peelle, Small, Burnum, Camp, Hyslop, Heath, Brickhouse, Leigh.

The minutes of the last meeting of the Common Council read and approved.

The minutes of the last meeting of the Select Council were read and approved except as follows:

FOUNDATION FOR PAVEMENTS.

The report of the special committee on foundation of pavements was adopted. The committee recommend double pavements, except upon hard clay foundations, and state that single pavements on such foundations is an experiment. The Council also adopted a resolution prohibiting the use of rubble stone, except in special instances with consent of Council.

Resolution to appropriate \$1,000 for water meters, to be paid from funds of Water Department. Adopted.

Resolution to appropriate \$20,000 for gang well system from funds of Water Department. Adopted.

Resolution in matter of bids for street paving by contract. This Council concurred with Select in requiring bids to be submitted to the Council under specifications prepared by the city engineer.

Petition of E. J. Acker Construction Company to erect a sewerage plant in Brambleton. Concurred with Select Council.

Resolution from Select Council to appoint a committee of two from each Council to consider the erection of a bridge between Atlantic City and the Third Ward. Concurred with the Select Branch and appointed committee.

MONEY FOR HOSE.

Resolution to pay \$1,000 for hose about further reference to the Council, concurred with Select Council.

Resolution from the Least Board of improvement of Brambleton Ward to bid \$848 for Marshall avenue water main, concurred with Select Council.

Ordinance to increase the number of police to sixty four, laid over by the Select Council and concurred in by this branch.

NEW BUSINESS.

Opinion of the City Attorney and letter of City Treasurer in matter of exigency, requiring extra police at cost of \$168, was referred to Finance Committee.

Report of Finance Committee, approving petition of A. B. Seidner in matter of Charlotte street improvements, asking return of assessment of \$177. Adopted.

Resolution approved by Finance Committee to appropriate \$100 for court allowance to T. I. Hubbard. Adopted.

Report of Finance Committee disapproving report of School Committee recommending \$40,000 for schools. Adopted.

Court allowance of \$225 to H. L. Worthington approved by the Finance Committee. Adopted.

Report of Finance Committee approving petition of W. W. Dey, Commissioner of Revenue, in the matter of erroneous assessment. Adopted.

ATLANTIC CITY MONEY.

Finance Committee approved a report recommending the adoption of a resolution to loan \$2,500 to Atlantic City Ward was recommended to the Finance Committee.

Report of Finance Committee, approving petition of sundry persons to erect frame houses. Granted.

In the matter of paving York street, from James to Smith, at a cost of \$3,820. Resolutions of expediency were adopted.

Resolutions of expediency were adopted looking to paving Yarmouth street with Belgian block.

All properly approved bills were ordered to be paid and adjourned to meet Thursday night at 8 o'clock.

THE NEGRO EXHIBIT.

The Virginia Commission Holds Its Third Day's Session.

The Virginia Commission for a negro exhibit at the Cotton States and International Exposition met in the pastor's study of the St. John's A. M. E. Church yesterday for the third day's session.

The commission decided to hold meetings in Richmond April 20th; Petersburg, April 30th; Farmville, May 1st; Danville, June 10th; Lynchburg, June 11th; Roanoke, June 12th; Wytheville, June 13th; Abingdon, June 14th; Staunton, July 15th; Charlottesville, July 16th; Alexandria, July 17th, and Fredericksburg, July 18th. The final meeting will be held in Richmond during the month of August, at which time the exhibits will be massed and shipped to Atlanta for installation.

The following resolution was introduced and adopted:

"WHEREAS, reports have come to the Virginia Board of the Negro Commission of the Cotton States and International Exposition, from the cities of Charlottesville, Lexington, Bedford City, Lynchburg, Norfolk, Salem and from public school collections in several cities and counties in the State; and

"WHEREAS, these reports are very gratifying and helpful to the Commission in the prosecution of their work; therefore,

"Resolved, That this Commission, by unanimous adoption of this resolution, expresses to all parties concerned their sincere thanks for the amounts raised in the various places named; and hope that this is only a beginning of efforts put forward by these friends for the collecting, forwarding, installing and supervising of a creditable exhibit at the Atlanta Exposition; further, that it may serve as an example for those who have inaugurated plans for the raising of funds in other places."

A resolution of thanks to Rev. Sam W. Small was introduced and carried.

The commission after transacting other routine business adjourned to meet in Richmond April 29th. Most of the Commissioners remained over and spoke at a large mass meeting held in the North Street A. M. E. Church, Portsmouth, Va., last night. I. Garland Penn, Chief Commissioner of Virginia, will speak at a public meeting and banquet to-night at Armory Hall in Hampton, Va.

The Commissioners expressed themselves as being highly pleased with their entertainment in Norfolk and were very thankful for the courtesies accorded them by the press of the city.

The Commissioners have issued an address to the colored people of Virginia outlining their general work and asking the co-operation of their race.

PASSENGER RATES SLASHED

The Seaboard Air-Line Begins Active Warfare.

ITS FIGHT AGAINST BOYCOTTS

The Established Passenger Rates Nearly Cut in Half to Points in Georgia. Will a Reduction in Freight Rates Follow? Another Surprise Expected.

The Seaboard Air-Line, against whom a boycott was declared by the Southern Railway and Steamship Association on the 1st instant, last night threw a bomb shell into the camp of the enemy by announcing a terrible reduction in passenger rates between Northern points and the principal competing points in Georgia.

This move on the part of the Seaboard Air-Line management will probably spread consternation along the lines of the competing roads, which will be forced to meet the cut in prices or lose their passenger business. It is claimed that the Southern Railway cannot operate at the reduced prices without a heavy loss, and even if they come down to the Seaboard's figures on the passenger traffic the latter road may spring another surprise in the way of a heavy cut in freight rates.

The Seaboard Air-Line people last night wired their agents along the line to begin to day selling tickets between the principal competitive points in Georgia, including Atlanta, at the following figures: To New York, at \$14, a cut of \$10; Philadelphia, \$11.80, a cut of \$9.70; Baltimore, \$10, a cut of \$8.70; Washington, \$9.50, a cut of \$8; Norfolk and Portsmouth, \$8, a cut of \$5.75; Petersburg, \$9.15, a cut of \$6.35; Richmond, \$9.80, a cut of \$5.70.

This cut in passenger rates, in connection with the injunction against the Southern railway, will probably give Seaboard Air-Line a big advantage in the fight.

Ed. of the *Virginian*:

To find the best new name, or the best combination of ancient names, seems to be a practical difficulty in the way of forming here a great triune city out of our triplet of embryos.
