The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Mr. Lewis, of Street Committee, reported certain work done on streets and called attention to the condition of intersection of Charles street and Brambleton avenue.

Mr. Bunting, of the School Committee, handed in a list of children from the county attending school in the ward.

Mr. Benham reported certain extra work to be done at the new school house, whereupon, on motion of Mr. Sterling, the committee was instructed to make estimates and solicit bids for said work and report at the next meeting.

Rev. J. J. Hall, D. D., being present was accorded the floor to call attention to the necessity of some better side walks on Highland avenue.

Mr. Lewis, of a special committee for the purpose, reported work not completed at Campostella bridge by Messrs. Bolton & Co.

On motion, Mr. Schofield, contractor, was given ten days in which to begin work of paving intersections.

Mr. Bassett presented a communication from Maj. G. W. Taylor asking that the Board put a few more shells on Kelley avenue, which was granted.

A communication was received from the Board of Health calling attention to the unsanitary condition of wooden gutters, which, on motion, was referred to the Street Committee.

A communication from the same advised the payment of the bill of Bolton & Co. for abating the Maple avenue nuisance, without further delay and trouble. Filed.

Mr. Outten presented a petition from Messrs. Gale, Waddy and Winston, for privilege to build a temporary boat house at the foot of Willoughby avenue. Granted.

On motion, the Board accepted an order given by Mr. J. C. Teague in favor of Mr. D. C. Lassiter, to the amount of what may be due the former at the completion of the new correction house, not to exceed \$67.50.

An application was made asking that Mr. Blessingham be made janitor of the public school which was endorsed by the Board and referred to the trustees of the school.

Messrs. Brown, Guynn and Halstead asked leave of absence for a week during summer. Referred to the Police Committee.

City Engineer Brooks made a statement by communication that he had made a profile of Kelly avenue for improvements at an estimated total cost of \$3,500. Referred to the Street Committee for special report at next meeting.

Mr. Outten called attention to certain poles standing in the way on Clairborne avenue.

Bills were allowed and the Board adjourned.
