Eight companies of the Fifteenth Pennsylvania Volunteers, who have been stationed at Fort Washington and Sheridan's Point for some months past, left this city to-day on the steamer "Pentz" for Washington, where they will take trains for their homes.

Daniel Griffin, a well known colored resident of the southwestern section of the city, died suddenly this morning. He attended services at St. Mary's church and on his way home where he died soon afterwards. He had been a paralytic for some years.

Charles S. Jett, aged thirty-five, and Maud Gordon, who appeared to be sixteen, applied for a marriage license in Washington yesterday. The young lady refused to answer when the clerk asked her age, as she did not when her mother's husband impounded her to answer the query. In consequence the contemplated wedding was postponed. They both came from Rollins Fork, King George county. Jett left the City Hall in disgust, and silently as ever the young lady followed on after him.

A fight occurred in the northeastern section of the city yesterday afternoon, during which a colored woman named Margie Pendleton was badly beaten by a colored man named Frank Payne. Payne was arrested by Officer Davis. He accused the Pendleton woman of informing the police of a conspiracy some time past, let the police last Sunday morning, when ten colored men were arrested, and avowed his intention of "getting even" with her. It was discovered that the woman's leg was broken and that she was otherwise injured. This morning Payne was fined \$50, or given 90 days in jail.
