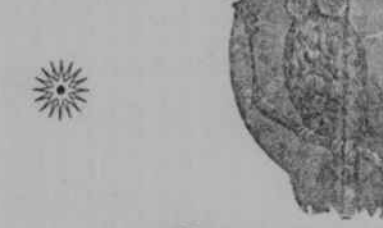

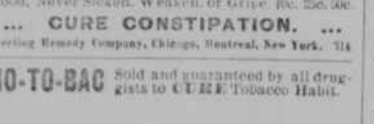

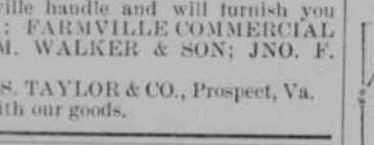

How a Massachusetts Gardener Built a Very Good Greenhouse for Very Little Money.

I have seen from time to time instructions on building various styles of greenhouses. Now I think I have one that some others would like. It is one which I made myself during my leisure moments, both night and morning. I present the drawings that others may do as I did. The plan is 16-feet to the foot. The rafters and uprights I had made, but the rest of the work I did myself.

There are two skylights on the east and one on the west side, two slide windows in the belt on each side of the house. From the bottom of the belt to the ground is 3 1/2 feet. This can be made from old boxes, with a cleat or strip over the crack of the edges.

The boiler room is two feet deep. The bottoms or sides are cemented or stones laid in cement. The top and sides are lined with sheet iron and painted to keep from rusting. The chimney is of brick about seven feet

The ventilator over the boiler is of galvanized iron, eight inches in diameter, six feet high with a damper in it. This takes away gas that may escape, and is regulated at night to keep the house ventilated.

The boiler is for hot water, and is the best thing of its kind I have ever seen for a portable boiler. This is the second winter I have used it, and I do not have any trouble to keep the house at 60 degrees, when it is zero outside. It takes two tons of egg coal, and one-half ton of screenings for the year round by putting on a little coal four times a day. The coal bin will hold one-half ton of coal and one-half ton of screenings.

There is about 112 feet of two-inch piping in the form of the letter L running under the west side and end of bench. The east side is portable, so I can take the bench down when I want to stand chrysanthemums on the ground. After they are gone I put the bench up again, and everything is all right.

The water tank is supplied with water from the roof of the shed. The house and shed are double boarded on 2 by 4 joist, making it four inches thick and filled with sawdust. There are two doors at the entrance. The outside door is a good thing, as it keeps the other door from freezing or sweating.—Charles S. Bingham, in American Gardening.

It is well to remember that it is not the freezing, but the thawing in the light that injures plants the most. Should even tender plants be frozen and thawed out in a low temperature, and in the dark, many of them would survive.—Western Plowman.

Japanese Plums Are Hardy. Joseph Meehan says in the Practical Farmer that the Japanese plums seem to have the power of resisting the curculio. The crescent-shaped marks are often seen upon the fruit, but whether no eggs are deposited or they fail to hatch he cannot tell, but no perceptible injury is apparent. Many trees were so overladen with fruit that it would have been an advantage if some had been destroyed by the insect. In one orchard under his observation about the close of July there were two or three weeks of hot, rainy weather, and many of the plums were attacked by rot and fell off. This often occurs among the old varieties in such weather. As the Japanese plums are nearly all hardy, whether early or late, he considers them a decided acquisition.

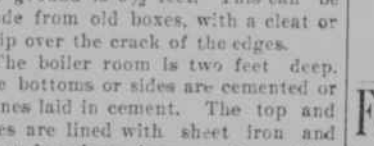

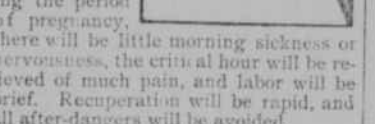
