Humble Vocation Should Rightly Be Regarded as One of Honor. Woman's Opportunity in the Kitchen and Nursery.

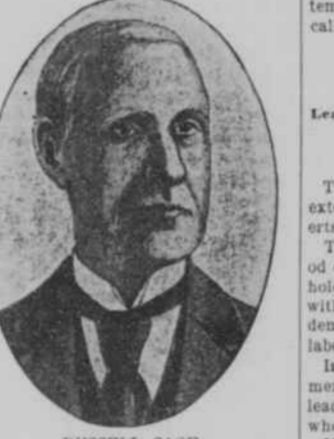

SIMPLE BOOKKEEPING.

Lead Pencil May Be Used Just as Well as Pen and Ink, Says One Who Knows.

The supervision of every store should extend to the books, says Victor Robertson, in Credit Men's Bulletin. The simplest is always the best method of expression. Why use a pen, pencil, ink and eraser, when a pencil with a rubber on the end will supply all demands better, cheaper, and with less labor?

Bookkeeping is only memorandum work, anyhow. Make it as simple and easy as possible. Don't waste profit in ink. It is the little leaks that eat up the profits. Unnecessary labor is a leak. Expensive paper in books is wasteful. I believe in cheap paper and pencils, bright boys or girls who can add and subtract, and good common sense business judgment to tell them how to put the figures down so they will add up something to show the movement of the business.
