Mr. McHugh of Waterbury and Mr. Corry of Montpelier opposed the measure and offered several proposals of amendment. Amendments offered by Mr. Ames of Brighton, Mr. Hay of New Haven, Mr. Peck of Burlington, Mr. Russell of Kirby moved the previous question.
