BECKER CASE IS STRONGER

Whitman Has Evidence in Reserve

OVERHEARD TALK BY BECKER

Hart's Motion to Examine Minutes Is Denied—No Signs of Anything That Will Cause a Delay.

New York, Oct. 1.—The case against Lieutenant Becker is far stronger than has appeared from the reports published in the newspapers, it was said at the district attorney's office yesterday.

The fight that has been made by Messrs. McIntyre and Hart to examine the minutes of the grand jury that indicted Lieutenant Becker was lost yesterday when Justice Goff denied five motions that had been made by Mr. Hart.

Justice Goff quoted a part of the grand jury minutes to show that the questions and answers were no violation of the relationship between lawyer and client.

The decision removed another possibility of delaying the trial. John F. McIntyre, chief counsel for the defense, has said several times that no further delays would be asked for and that no fight for a change of venue would be made.

BALKAN WAR CLOUDSDARKEN

Bulgarian and Servian Armies Mobilized

ANSWER TO TURKISH ORDER

For Extended Manoeuvres—100,000 Ottoman Reserves Are Summoned—Russia Said to Be Greatly Stirred Over the Situation.

Sofia, Bulgaria, Oct. 1.—The mobilization of the Bulgarian army was proclaimed by the government to-day. The action was taken in consequence of alarming news received here as to the concentration of large forces of Turkish troops in the neighborhood of Adrianople and along the Bulgarian frontier.

Belgrade, Serbia, Oct. 1.—Orders for the general mobilization of the Servian army were signed to-day. The Skupstina has been summoned to meet on Thursday in extraordinary session.

FIVE DIED IN FIRE.

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BUSY WEEK FOR TAFT

President Has Long List of Engagements

BEGINS BY MEETING CROWDS

His Physical Condition Is Much Improved—Colonel Roosevelt Began Yesterday With Speech in Chattanooga.

Boston, Oct. 1.—President Taft's vacation obviously is having the desired effect; his strong handshake, coat of tan and bright eyes all indicate a marked improvement in his health.

Colonel Roosevelt opened yesterday in Chattanooga. He says he "took them by surprise" in Atlanta. "They tried to break up my meeting," said he. "But I got them going; they couldn't make it."

New York Democrats are finding it difficult to have an unbossed convention at Syracuse while Chief Murphy controls 400 of the 450 votes in the convention, and he still believes Governor Dix should be renominated.

A letter from President Roosevelt to Cornelius N. Bliss, written in 1906, and denying that he had ever been influenced in any way by campaign fund contributions was the feature of the renewal of the Senate committee's investigation at Washington.

GOV. HADLEY STICKS BY PRESIDENT TAFT

Missouri Judges Support Suggestions of Kansas City Man.

Kansas City, Mo., Oct. 1.—Amendments to the marriage and divorce laws that the Missouri legislature will be asked to enact have been framed by W. W. Wright of Kansas City, divorce professor. Mr. Wright is being supported in the work by the circuit judges of the county.

Physical certification before marriage. Six months' publication of matrimonial status. Prohibition of marriage by incompetents, degenerates and criminals.

Interlocutory divorce decree one year after divorce suit is filed. Divorce not final until one year after decree. Defendant prohibited from remarriage during life of plaintiff.

Using the Attic.
